Accident to Pioneer Implement Dealer Has Fatal Termination—Junction Board of Works.

Toronto Junction, July 25.—The board of works held its regular meeting in the town hall to-night, with Councillor Ryding in the chair.

Mr. Greniaus and other property owners on Quebec-avenue complained that the sewer laid on that street had not been properly inspected.
