Canada Life Policyholders.

When the stockholders of the Canada Life Assurance Company decided to remove the head offices from Hamilton to Toronto, it was to be expected that those who did not prevail in their opposition to removal would make themselves heard. Nor, beyond a certain point, do we blame any Hamilton citizen for that. But it must be remembered the great bulk of the policyholders of the company are not citizens of Hamilton, and cannot be expected to take sides in the merely local aspect of the case. What policyholders in general are interested in is the protection of their families. It has not been shown that the removal of the head offices of the company to the financial and legislative capital of the Province will have an injurious effect on the value and safety of the interests referred to, but rather the contrary.

But the Hamilton dissidents declined to be appeased; and accordingly organized themselves into a policyholders' organization, for the purpose, among other things, of asking legislative provision for the representation of But this has long been the desire of Senator Cox, the largest shareholder, and legislative notice has already been given. It would seem as if local and personal feeling were largely at the bottom of the action being taken by some of the citizens of Hamilton.

We understand that a meeting of some of the London policyholders has been called by Mr. Samuel Barker, of Hamilton, for tomorrow evening, at the office of Fraser & Fraser. It would be wise for London policyholders to think the matter well over before they become the agents of the local feeling of Hamiltonians, or of persons who failin contest with abler men.

In this connection, it may be worth while reproducing an interview with Senator Cox in the Toronto Globe:

"The representative asked Mr. Cox had any objection to state his views regarding the representation of policyholders on the board of the Canada Life.

"Mr. Cox replied as follows: 'My views on that subject are well known to every member of the last board of the company, including the gentlemen who were not re-elected. I desire to see a provision made in the general insurance bill, which I understand is now in course of preparation at Ottawa, under which a fair proportion of the board should be directors elected by the policyholders. When the fact that I held these views was made known some years ago to the gentlemen who were not re-elected, they stated that nothing from the shareholders to the policyholders would satisfy them. I need not hesitate to make this fact public, because at the annual meeting on Tesday they reiterated the statement. That lumbia. the shareholders and directors of a company which has existed as a stock company for 50 years, and which under stock management has been so sugcessful and satisfactory in its growth.

should be asked to part with all control to a vast number of persons scattered all over Canada and the United States, only needs to be stated to show that the motives of those who proposed such a change were not those of champions of policyholders, but were motives prompted by unfortunate personal feelings towards myself. I have always been willing to join in any reasonable representation of the policyholders, but nothing reasonable would satisfy the

gentlemen referred to.' "The Globe representative then asked if the quarrel which appears to have existed for some time between Mr. Cox and these gentlemen had anything to do with the proposed removal from Hamilton to Toronto of the chief offices of the company

"'Not at all,' said Mr. Cox. 'The reasons were fully given at the annual meeting. Whether rightly or wrongly, we believe that the company can no longer do justice to itself without having its chief place of business in one of the financial centers of the Dominion We must remember that Hamilton has a population of only about 50,000, while Toronto has considerably over 200,000. The officers of the company have to supervise a business extending throughout Canada and in Michigan, Ohio, Illinois and Minnesota. 
