London, Nov. 4.—More than 20,000 prisoners and several hundred guns have been taken by the 48th British division operating on the Asiago Plateau towards the Trentino, it is announced in an official statement issued by the war office today.

AUSTRO-HUNGARIAN TERRITORY OPENED FOR ALLIED OPERATIONS AGAINST THE GERMAN EMPIRE

ARMISTICE TERMS SIGNED BY AUSTRIA

Washington, Nov. 4.—The terms of the Austrian armistice, with parenthetical explanations of minor errors in cable transmission, were announced by the State Department today as follows: Following are the terms of the armistice imposed upon Austria, which went into effect at 3 o'clock today:

Military Conditions. FIRST.—The immediate cessation of hostilities by land, by sea and air.

SECOND. Total demobilization of the Austro-Hungarian army and immediate withdrawal of all Austro-Hungarian forces operating on the front from the North Sea to Switzerland, Austro-Hungarian territory limited as in Clause 3 below. There shall only be maintained as an organized military force, half the divisional rendered to the Ailles and the United states of America for delivery to them, beginning with all such mater-lal as exists in the territories to be evacuated by the Austro-Hungarian

THIRD.-Evacuation of all territories invaded by Austro-Hungary since the beginning of the war, withdrawa within such periods as shall be deterwithin such periods as shall be determined by the commander-in-chief of the Allied forces on each front of the Austro-Hungarlan armies behind a line fixed as follows: From Pic Umbrall to the north of the Stelvio it will follow the crest of the Rhetian Alps up to the sources of the Adige and the Elsach, passing thence by Mounts Reschen and Brenner and the Heights of Oetz and Zoaller. The line thence turns south crossing Mount Toblach and meeting the present frontier of Carnic Alps.

It follows this frontier up to Mount Tarvis and after Mount Tarvis the

Tarvis and after Mount Tarvis the watershed of the Julian Alps by the Col of Predit, Mt. Mangart, the Tricorno (Tergiou) and the watershed of the Cols DI Podberdo Podlaniscam and Idria. From this point the line turns southeast towards the Schneeberg, excludes the whole basin of the Save and its tributaries. From Schneeberg is goes down towards the coast in such way as to Include Castua, Mattuglia and Volosca in the evacuated terri-

It will also follow the administrative limits of the present province of Dalmatla, including the North Lisarica and Trivania and to the south, territory limited by a line from the Semigrand) of Cape Planca to the summits of the watersheds eastwards, so as to Include in the evacuated area all the valleys and water course flowing towards Sebenico, such as the Cicola, Kerka, Butisnica and their tributaries. It will also include all the islands to the north and west of Dalmatla from Premuda, Selve, Ulbo, Scherda, Maon, Paga and Puntadura, in the north up Meleda, in the south embracing Santandrea, Busi, Lisa, Lesina, Ter-cola, Curzola, Cazza and Lagosta, as well as the neighboring rocks and islets and passages, only excepting the Islands of Great and Small Zlorna, Bua, Solta and Brazza. All territory thus evacuated (shall be occupied by

United States of America. All military and railway equipment of all kinds, including coal belonging to or within those territories (to be?) left in Situ and surrendered to the Allies, according to special orders given by the commander-in-chief of the forces of the associated powers on the different fronts. No new destruc tion, pillage or requisition to be done by enemy troops in the territories to evacuated by them, and occupied by the forces of the associated powers.

OURTH.-The Allies shall have the right of free movement over all road and rall and waterways in Austro-Hungarian territory and of the use of the necessary Austrian and Hungarian means of transportation. The armies of the associated powers shall occupy such strategic points in Austria-Hungary at times as they may deem necessary to enable them to conduct military operations or to maintain

They shall have the right of requi-

sition on payment for the troops of the associated powers (wherever?) they may be. FIFTH.—Complete evacuation of all a subscription of \$250,000

German troops within fifteen days, not only from the Italian and Balkan fronts, but from all Austro-Hungarian territory. Internment of all German troops which have not left Austria-Hungary within the date.

SIXTH.—The administration of the evacuated territories of Austria-Hungary will be entrusted to the local authorities under the control of the Allied and associated forces of occupation.

SEVENTH .- The Immediate repatriatria-Hungary personnel, who will be left on the spot with the medical material required.

Naval Conditions.

FIRST—Immediate cessation of all hostilities at sea and definite information to be given as to the location and movements of all Austro-Hungarian ships. Notification to be made to neutrals that freedom of navigation in all territorial waters is given to the naval and mercantile marine of the Allied and associated powers all questions of powers all questions of powers all questions of powers. powers, all questions of neutrality being walved.

SECOND—Surrender to Allies and the United States of fifteen Hungarian submarine completed between the years 1910 and 1918, and of all German submarines which are in or may hereafter enter Austro-Hungarian territorial waters. All other Austro-Hungarian submarines to be paid off and disarmed and to remain under the supervision of the Allies and the United States.

THIRD.—Surrender to Allies and United States with their complete armament three light cruisers, nine destroyers, twelve torpedoboats, one mine layer, six Danube monitors to be designated by the Allies, and United States of America. All other surface warships, including river craft, are to be concentrated in Austro-Hungarian bases to be designated by the Allies and United States of America, and are to be paid off and completely disarmed and placed under supervision of the Allies and United States of America.

FOURTH .- Freedom of navigation to all warships and merchant ships of alfied and associated powers to given in the Adriatic and up the River Danube and its tributaries in the territorial waters and territory of Austria-Hungary. The United States Fidelity and GuarArmistice Terms Signed By Austria Means Complete and Total Surrender of Enemy---Conditions Just as Drastic Will, It Is Expected, Be Imposed on the Germans By the Versailles Council.

Washington, Nov. 4 .- Terms of armistice under which the land and sea forces of what was once the Austro-Hungarian Empire have laid down their arms were announced today simultaneously in Washington and the Allied capitals. They accomplish tion without reciprocity of all Allied complete surrender and open Austrian and Hungarian territory of civil populations evacuated from their homes on conditions to be laid from this drastic document, it may be accomplish to the first the formal subjects for American and Allied operations against Germany.

From this drastic document, it may be stated, may be gleaned down by the commander-in-chief of the forces of the associated powers on the various fronts. Sick and wounded who cannot be removed from evacuated territory will be cared for by Austral Harden and the cared for by Austral Harden are set to the care of the conditions nearing completion in the supreme war council at Versailles, under which Germany may have a cessation of hostilities.

The terms under which the debacle on the Italian front ended today at 3 p.m. (9 a.m. Eastern American time), include complete demobilization of Austrian forces, surrender of one half of all artillery and military equipment, occupation by American and Allied forces of such strategic places as may later be selected, use of Austrian railroads for operations against Germany; evacuation of all invaded territory, leaving behind all equipment and supplies, including coal; surrender of a portion of the Austrian surface and submarine fleets and disarmament of others under American and Allied control; surrender of all German submarines in Austrian waters and repatriation of Allied and American prisoners without

EVACUATION OF AUSTRIAN TERRITORY.

Evacuation of Austrian territory roughly corresponds to the boundary lines claimed by Italy under the Italia-Irredentia or treaty of London program. The right of occupation by Allied forces is reserved, local authorities to maintain order under Allied supervision.

The terms of the armistice are to be carried out under the direction of Marshal Foch, who will designate material to be and equipment of three battleships, turned over and supervise the movement of Austro-Hungarian forces to the rear.

All German troops in Austria-Hungary, Italy or the Balkans must be out, or interned, within fifteen days.

Destruction of any property by retreating forces is specifically Ships to be surrendered include fifteen modern Austrian sub-

marines, three battleships, three light cruisers, nine destroyers, twelve torpedo-boats, one mine-layer and six Danube monitors to be designated by the Allies. All other war craft are to be concentrated and disarmed under Allied direction.

FREE NAVIGATION OF WATERS.

Free navigation of all Austrian waters by both the war and ommercial fleets of the Allies is provided for. All Austrian naval aircraft are to be put out of commission and concentrated under Allied control. All Austrian harbor and other equipment in occupied Italian ports is to be left untouched.

The Danube route is to be kept open by the occupation or dismantling of fortresses to be selected by the Allied commanders. The existing blockade of the Allies against Austria remains unchanged, Austrian ships being liable to capture where found,

except where a commission, to be named later, provides otherwise. All fortresses protecting Austrian naval bases or stations are to be occupied, and the arsenal at Pola is specifically surrendered. All Allied craft held by Austria are to be returned immediately. The only organized military force Austria is permitted to retain is limited to that necessary to maintain order in her own

AWARDED THE MILITARY RUSSIA EXPECTED TO REFUSE PAYMENT OF **FURTHER INDEMNITIES**

Copenhagen, Nov. 4 .- The indications are that Russia will refuse to make any further indemnity payments to Germany, according to the Frankfort

Gazette. The newspaper says that Russia, which had paid two installments of the war indemnity, has stopped the transport of gold and bank notes to Germany. "Evidently," adds the Gazette, "sheet refuses to pay the last part of the indemnity."
