

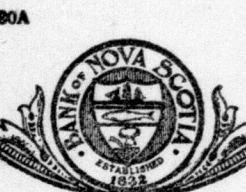

SCHOOLS NEGLECT TO TEACH CITIZENSHIP, SAYS WOMAN U. F. O.

Mrs. Laws Addresses Thousands at U.F.O. Clubs of N. Oxford Picnic.

NO GRITS OF TORIES IN U.F.

President Outlines the Non-Party Platform of the United Farmers.

WOODSTOCK, July 24.—The U. F. O. clubs of North Oxford held their first annual picnic here today, and it was a great success, thousands of farmers and their families being present from all parts of the county. A good sports program was run off. A baseball game between Embro and Jackson was another attraction, Embro winning by a score of 10 to 7.

Speeches were made by Mrs. Laws of Cayuga, who spoke in the interests of the United Farm Women of Ontario; also John Lillico, reeve of Embro and warden of Oxford County and nominee of the U. F. O. of North Oxford, and the Independent Labor party of Woodstock for the Federal House, and J. Halbert, president of the United Farmers of Ontario.

URGES WOMEN TO ORGANIZE. Mrs. Laws, in her address, exhorted the farm women to realize the responsibility of citizenship of the Dominion and to organize in the United Farm Women movement for the betterment of the nation. Citizenship must be improved and inculcated into every child and citizen. The farmers are not striving to antagonize the urban people, but they want to unite for their betterment and for the betterment of all, she said. Mrs. Laws spoke of the school curricula in Ontario, and said they neglected to teach citizenship. "I don't know of one single thing in the school curricula of Ontario, which teaches citizenship," she said.

TREMENDOUS UNREST NOW. Mr. Lillico spoke at some length. Tremendous unrest exists in Canada at the present, he said. "We must unite to overcome difficulties and improve the country. The farmers must get together. It has been admitted that they are and have been the burden-bearers of the country for years past. Their problems require solution now. They can be solved by men who are farmers and who represent the farmers' interests through the United Farmers' organization. The U. F. O. are independent in their views upon national affairs and act for themselves in political matters. However, the farmers and the urban people are all dependent one upon the other, hence movements for the betterment of one must tend to better the other. The interests of the farmers are best known by farmers, and, therefore, will be better looked after by farmers."

Mr. Halbert, president of the U. F. O., announced at the outset that he was going to try to tell the chips and fall where they may. He denounced the fact that the farmers show interest only up to the point where it is necessary to get out and work for their movements. If they wish their movements to bring them in beneficial results they must get busy and work together and spare no efforts.

No Grits or Tories. "The United Farmers," said he, "had prepared a platform of which they were proud. We will never have a Grit or Tory upon that platform," he said. "Physically, 'even if it is necessary to use bare knuckles to keep them off. The man belonging to the U. F. O. who accepts a Grit or Tory nomination, while I am president, will be expelled from the U. F. O. Don't let the Grits or Tories pull the wool over your eyes at the next election. Think and act for yourself. The U. F. O. is independent. It believes in politics, but not partyism; partyism must be left alone. We will never have true democracy in this country, while partyism is observed. The farmers perhaps do not realize that thirty per cent of the population is producing in other words, farmers. We are expected to feed and produce for the other seventy per cent. Let us get busy, then, if we are important, unite and see how our interests and the interest of others can be best served."

Mr. Halbert spoke at length upon the advisability of the farmers uniting and using their power, and upon the fact that the U. F. O. platform tended to the betterment of both city and country people.

VERDICT OF MURDER RETURNED BY JURY AT DEATH INQUEST

Neil Coates Taken To Jail With Charge Against Him.

HEARING IN AUGUST Both Men Are Well-Known in Ayton Com.

AYTON, July 24.—Inquiring into the death of William Umbach, coroner J. L. Easton and his jury tonight returned a verdict of murder against Neil Coates, who was taken to the county jail where he will be held in the county jail there until August 2, when he will be brought to Ayton for a preliminary hearing.

Inquest Verdict. During the inquest and following the verdict of the coroner's jury against him, Coates sat in the jury room of the quaint old county building, unmoved. Even when the verdict "Murder" reached his ears he sat staring straight to the front like a man in a trance. His thoughts seemed to be far away on some subject other than that of being charged with the taking of the life of another human being. Asked if he had a statement to make concerning the affair, the prisoner, in a voice that was almost inaudible, answered with trembling lips one single word: "No."

Both Well Known. The surrounding community is all agog at the suddenness of the killing of the late William Umbach. The taking of his life had caused gossip to fly far and wide in the little town of Ayton and the surrounding community. Both men were about 60 years of age, with wives and grown-up families.

The two men, Umbach and Coates, were district cattle buyers.

According to evidence given at the inquest the trouble which resulted in Umbach's death, followed an argument between the two men.

Among those who saw the two men in front of the Commercial Hotel were Andrew Schenk, Leslie Koester, Fred Schauss and Chas. Babin. They saw Coates strike Umbach, and as the latter fell, Schenk started forward to stop the affair, saying, "Here, men we can't let this go on." He was too late to prevent the tragic affair.

FOREST FIRES RAGE IN MANY PARTS OF CANADA AND U. S.

Dollar Settlement, Near Sault Ste. Marie, Wiped Out—Fire Threatens Nelson.

DETROIT, Mich., July 24.—Forest fires in Northern Michigan have again assumed serious proportions, according to advices received here this forenoon. It is reported that Dollar Settlement, about 30 miles northwest of Sault Ste. Marie, was wiped out late yesterday, but that all residents moved out in time. A blaze for a time yesterday threatened a number of houses on the outskirts of Sault Ste. Marie, but was brought under control by city employees.
