

## IF ORDERS-IN-COUNCIL FOR OTHER THINGS, WHY NOT FOR 8-HOUR DAY SAYS UNION MAN

Criticizes Borden's Stand On Matter—No Word To Local Labor From Toronto in Regard To General Strike.

Not a word from the striking labor men of Toronto has been sent to James Husey, secretary of the local trades and labor council, since the calling of the general strike. Mr. Husey did not wish to discuss the labor situation in this city—that is, the attitude of the men in regard to a general strike. "My personal opinion would be of little value," he said. "Besides, it might conflict with the opinions of others, and make an opening for an attack."

If all organized labor was called out, there would be some 5,000 strikers in London, he remarked.

All labor men, in every part of Canada, were strongly in favor of an eight-hour day law. This, he thought, was the cause of the general strikes, as far as he could ascertain. He was sure it was likely to occur in any municipality.

## SWELTERING SPOT IS MARKET TODAY, BUT BIG BUSINESS DONE

Butter Almost Ran Away From Excessive Heat.

### LARGEST MARKET YET

Spring Chickens, Spies, Rabbits and Babies' Baths On Sale.

If anyone happened to be in doubt as to which was the hottest spot in the city this morning he should have dropped down into the centre of the market. Here the very ground, devoid of all grass and trees, exuded intense heat. Butter, which was present in large quantities, threatened to run away altogether, and the object was to get rid of it as soon as possible. Desperate vendors mopped their brows, and wished they were anywhere else, while the throngs of purchasers, the largest yet this season, soon made the piles of lettuce, radishes, asparagus, onions, etc., diminish. These provided the only cool thought of the morning, bringing up visions of iceboxes and cool dining-rooms with the shades drawn. A few men and women in light dresses toyed with crisp salads and forgot the heat outside.

#### Real Spring Chickens.

There were really spring chickens on sale, although only a millionaire could buy them at \$1 a pound. "Looks as if half invalid could get away with two of them today," declared a sarcastic bystander, licking his chops and turning scornfully away. Eggs still keep up to 43 and 50 cents a dozen. This morning duck eggs were available, and sold for 5 cents each. Chicken, however, even yet a few apples are making their appearance, the very tail end of last season's crop. Ben Davis, a pitiful example of an apple, sold for 70 cents a peck, and a few stray spies, unusual at this time of the year, were being doled out in the market house like oranges. The last of the spies is true, and next year the crop promises to be a light one, according to Fruit Inspector Connor of this district.

Bumper Fruit Crop. With the exception of spies, however, there will be a bumper fruit crop, he says. All green vegetables were very plentiful on the market on account of the hot growing weather, and quantities of spring flowers were also on sale. Rows and rows of rabbit hutches were ranged along the shady side of the market house, while small boys half reluctantly pressing out the price at which they were offering their pets.

Towards King street a very lively auction sale was in progress, featuring beds, bedsteads, sewing machines, glass cases, and every other variety of household equipment, even down to a baby's bath. The people were pushing close in order not to miss a bargain, and over all, beating down with the greatest intensity, was the sun. It was a case of hurry up or be overcome with the heat.

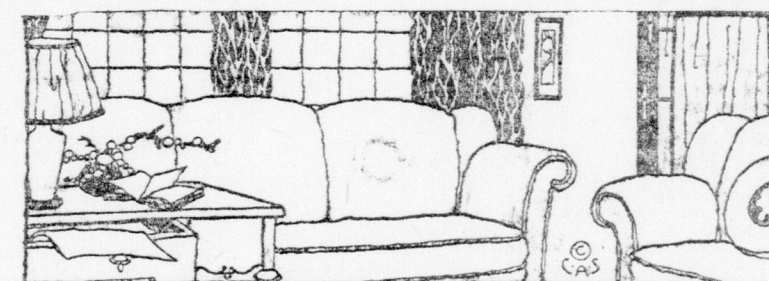

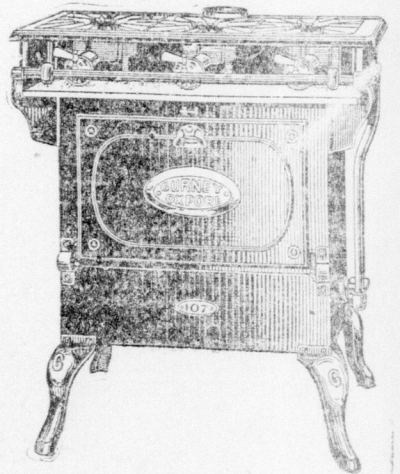

### ALLEGED BIGAMY CASE ADJOURNED TILL MONDAY

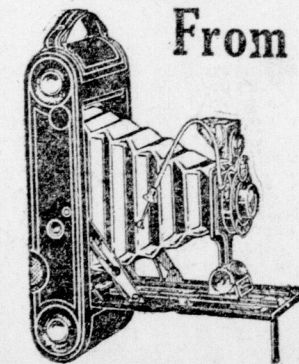
Owing to the mother and sister of James F. Hicks-Lynde being unable to attend the trial through illness, the case of bigamy performed by the accused, and which was opened at the court house before W. H. Chittick, J.P., was adjourned from Friday afternoon until Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Not, however, until the evidence of the plaintiff, Hicks-Lynde's wife (nee Frances A. England) had been taken. She met him last August, and was engaged on October 28, 1918, and married on January 22, 1919. Rev. Mr. Anderson of Lambeth performed the ceremony. Before they were married she had asked him if he was already married, but he replied in the negative. After marriage she had received anonymous letters stating that he was living with other women, but not that he had been married. Crown Attorney J. B. McKillop objected to several questions that W. R. Meredith, the defendant's counsel, put to the witness. When asked for his

ruling in the matter, Squire Chittick upheld the crown attorney. The counsel for the defence remarked that the crown attorney had better take his place before the county magistrate. "You were on the wrong trail altogether," said the crown. "You're making a farce of this," said Mr. Meredith.

In the accused's pocket the plaintiff had found a letter from his mother. It was alleged to have divulged the fact that he was married. The plaintiff then went to Toronto to see her mother-in-law about the matter.
