

FINDS STOLEN TIRES IN BARN

A London Township Farmer Makes Discovery At Bottom of Hay Mow.

When Arthur Smith, a London Township farmer, went this morning to remove some hay from a barn on his farm, lot 8, concession 4, he found at the bottom of the mow a full set of heavy truck tires. He reported the matter to High Constable Ben Watterworth, who turned the tires over to the city police, the latter having no corresponding numbers, showing that the tires had been stolen from a car at the C. P. R. station last winter.

No one lived on the farm where the tires were found, and the proprietor seldom visited the premises. Whether the thieves were still awaiting a safe opportunity to dispose of the tires or whether they may have been arrested for later thefts, it is not known.

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ONE SUBSCRIBER TO THOUSAND DOLLARS NO SHARE IN THE U. S. FOR NEARLY A WEEK FROM LONDON

Local Capitalists Have Faith in Big Building Project—Hotel Accommodation in London At Premium At the Present Time.

Already \$100,000 has been subscribed towards the new million dollar hotel project being promoted by the London Chamber of Commerce. This amount has been subscribed by ten leading citizens, the Chamber of Commerce bulletin announces under date of Monday, April 12.

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Western Ontario Isolated by Manager of Government Dispensaries Submits Figures.

Western Ontario is still isolated as far as the United States is concerned as a result of the embargo that has been put on all points of entry and affecting every railroad. Except for a carload of goods, no merchandise has been received in this city from that country, nor has anything been shipped to the United States for nearly a week.

Although hundreds of firms in every city of the United States have been forced to shut down, and thousands of men have been thrown out of work, local exporters have been affected only in a comparatively small way, and no real case of stress has been reported. The industries in the border cities have been affected to a greater extent than those located here.

It was pointed out by officials on the railroad that if the strike had occurred, or if such an embargo had gone into effect previous to the time of the high rate of exchange, the Canadian firms would have been affected to a far greater extent. During the past few months many firms, because they refused to pay the high rate of exchange, have learned to depend to a great extent on Canadian products for their raw material.

The exports, which have grown heavier during the past few months because of the same condition, will be seriously affected, according to the railroad officials.
