## ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS NO SHIPMENTS TO U. S. FOR NEARLY A **WEEK FROM LONDON**

Freight Embargo.

Western Ontario is still isolated as far as the United States is concerned as a result of the embargo that has been put on all points of entry and affecting every railroad. Except for a car of foodstuff and one of household furniture nothing has been received in this city from that country, nor has anything been shipped to the United States for nearly a week.

Although hundreds of firms in every city of the United States have been forced to shut down, and thousands of men have been thrown out of work, local factories have been affected only in a comparatively small way, and nor real case of stress has been reported. The industries in the border cities have been affected to a greater extent than those located here.

It was pointed out by officials on the railroad that if the strike had occurred, or if such an embargo had gone into effect previous to the time of the high rate of exchange, the Canadian firms would have been affected to a far greater extent. During the past few months many firms, because they refused to pay the high rate of eychange, have learned to depend to a great extent on Canadian products for their raw material.


