MISS HAYES' RECITAL in Society.

Conservatory Hall was practically filled last night to hear Miss Norah Hayes' violin recital. She was assisted by George Dixon, (tenor), and Mrs. Gerard Barton, (accompanist), and all three acquitted themselves in a thoroughly musically manner.

Miss Hayes, it may be said at once, is a young violinist, charmingly girlish in presence, who has a very promising future before her. She came very near virtuosity last night in her playing of Wieniawski's second concerto, for violin and piano. If her tone lacked a little mellowness, this was due not to her bowing, but to her instrument. Her chromatic runs in the allegro moderato (first movement), were smooth and clear, and in the andante non troppo her interpretation was poetic, while her tone took on a genuine singing quality. Miss Hayes was again effective in Orndie's serenade for violin and piano, and in Paganini's Solfarella, where she showed skilful command of technique, especially in the staccato passages. She was cheered repeatedly, and was the recipient three times of beautiful bouquets.

George Dixon, who has a pure and sympathetic voice, sang charmingly "Clay's setting to Kingsley's 'Sands of Dee,'" and with thoroughly dramatic effect "La Donna E Mobile" from Verdi's Rigoletto. Mrs. Gerard Barton proved a genuinely sympathetic and artistic accompanist. She should be heard often in that function. It is a pleasure to congratulate Miss Hayes and the assisting musicians on the success of last night's concert.

EFFORT MADE TO ADOPT SALARY SCALE FOR 1909

Proposal Was Lost on Close Vote—Fear of "Pull" in This Year's Increases.

A determined but unavailing effort to have a city salary scale come into effect this year, so as to avoid complications with the increases for 1909, was made in the city council yesterday afternoon.

On Controller Ward introducing the by-law, to grade civic salaries, Ald. Foster moved to strike out the clause which made an exception of salaries for the police and fire departments. This that all appointments, promotions and increases of salaries were to be made by the board of control on the recommendation of the controller. The amendment and approved by the council. Ald. Keeler argued that the effect of this would be to destroy the schedule. Only 210 votes were cast for the amendment.

The alderman then proposed that the salary schedule be adopted for 1909, instead of Jan. 1, 1909. He declared there was danger that some of the salary increases this year might exceed the maximum provided in the schedule. There were rumors that this would be done in one or two cases.

Controller Hocken admitted it was likely some increases recommended this year would be in excess of the prescribed annual increments, but said that if the schedule went into effect this year it would be unfair to some civic employees. The board had, however, no power to increase any salary beyond the maximum in the scale.

Ald. R. E. Graham objected that there was nothing to prevent the controller from raising salaries this year to the maximum, which might not otherwise be reached for five years. This way was open for employees to use "pull" with the controllers and get unreasonably large increases.

Ald. Foster consented to amend his motion so as to have the schedule become effective on Jan. 1, 1909. This narrowly escaped carrying, being lost on a vote as follows:

For—Ald. Keeler, R. H. Graham, Foster, Hocken, McMurich, Chisholm, J. J. Graham, Bengough, Bredin and Maguire—11.

Against—The Mayor, Controllers Ward, Hocken, Keeler, R. E. Graham, Bengough, Chisholm, Church, J. J. Graham, Adams, McMurich, Bengough and Eredin—16.

Against—Ald. Durand, Hocken, McMurich, J. J. Graham, Vaughan, O'Neill and Maguire—7.

Ald. J. J. Graham's motion to transfer several clerks in the collection branch from the grade of first-class to "second-class" clerks was lost.

Morden H. Long is Appointed by McMaster University.

Morden H. Long, B.A., a graduate of 1908, is McMaster's first Rhodes scholar by direct appointment. Ralph Bellamy, B.A., a graduate of 1903, was appointed as Alberta's first Rhodes Scholar, but Mr. Long has the honor of being the first man to go direct from McMaster to Oxford.

Mr. Long is a son of Ralph Long, confectioner, of Woodstock, and is 22 years of age. He has his early education at Woodstock, attending the public schools, the collegiate, and afterwards Woodstock College, winning the D. W. Kerr general proficiency scholarship in his second and third years, and being awarded the governor-general's medal on his graduation. He also won the prize in public speaking.

At McMaster he specialized in the English and history course, graduating with a very high standing. He averaged first-class honors through. He got the governor-general's medal for general proficiency in the first and second year, and in his third year the Zenas Freeman prize in special Latin. In his third year he was elected president of his class. He twice represented his class in inter-year debates. In his first year he was chosen to represent McMaster in the final of the intercollegiate debating series, and together with W. A. Scott, brought the Kerr Shield to McMaster.

In religion he is a Presbyterian. The year Rhodes scholar is at present attending the Provincial Normal College at Calgary.

LENTEN SERMON

"Some old truths about man" will form the theme for this week's series of Lenten sermons at St. James' Cathedral. Rev. Canon Welch at the first thing to do was to take a look at the first chapter of the Book of Genesis. He wished it to be clearly understood that he would not enter in any way into the unseemly controversy which is now raging among some men in regard to the origin of man as a spiritual being, and that it is one of the most ancient records in existence.

God's purpose in the creation of man is described in the sublime words of the first chapter of Genesis: "Let us make man in our own image." It is natural to think that the resemblance to God would be in respect to those characteristics in which man differs from the lower animals. Man has reason, animals instinct. Man has self-consciousness. Man has the power of making a moral choice. The lower animals have not. So if he will man may attain to heights of holiness impossible to lower animals. The human soul is made to God and can hold communion with Him.

The purpose of God is also shown in the additional words, "After His likeness." Man by slow degrees was to become like God in character.

The human race may have entered upon existence without consciousness of evil with the stainless innocence of a child, but that is very different to the perfect human character that is revealed in the life of Christ. God's eternal purpose has been and is for man to attain this perfect likeness to the life of Christ. This man should be like Christ in character.

In the world at large a very different condition to that of God's ideal is to be seen. Instead of living in peace society is divided into individuals, classes and races who, like Ishmael, have their hearts against every man's brother. There is the evil of widespread intemperance, the contagion of deadly immorality, reckless malice in business and political life, the corruption in politics, and the different nations trust mutual suspicion and hatred. Men are hardly less burdensome than open war.

When an inward glance is taken, the introspection reveals selfish impulses and restless toiling passions. The ideal is in graphic contrast with the actual life of man. Men are finally frustrated by man's sinfulness, but must ultimately hold good. Men and women know that they are capable of higher things, and that by the grace of Christ's incarnation they can grow into His likeness.

Many a weary sufferer rocked on a sea of pain finds rest; many a broken heart, consolation; in the assurance that while "this affliction is but for a moment, there awaits a far more exceeding weight of glory." All men are responsible, whether Christians or not, for every action, thought or word in life helps or hinders God's all loving plan.
