LEAPELLO INQUEST  
DEVELOPS NO CLUE

Witnesses Could Throw No  
Light on Probable Cause  
of Murder.

POLICEMAN SAW CAR

Took Number Because Driver  
Was Exceeding the  
Speed Limit.

Witnesses testified at the re-  
sumed inquiry into the death of Tony  
Leapello, the taxi-driver, who was  
brutally murdered early on Fri-  
day morning, July 20, at Salisbury  
avenue, Humber Bay, but nothing of  
importance developed to assist the po-  
lice in their search for the man and  
woman who hired the car. The in-  
quiry is being conducted by a jury  
under Coroner C. Ricker at the Humber  
Beach Inn, and an adjournment was  
made last night until Wednesday  
next.

With one exception the witnesses  
were chauffeurs, and their evidence  
was mainly in connection with their  
acquaintance with the murdered man.  
None of them had ever known Leapello  
which might have resulted in the mur-  
der.

Joseph Pils, a railroad fireman, and  
for sometime a chauffeur, said he was  
acquainted with Leapello for 12 or 14  
years. During this time he had been  
in the taxi business. Shortly after  
midnight on Friday morning a girl and  
a man came to the taxi stand, the former  
stating that they wanted to go to  
High Park. The man did not speak at  
all.

Had Seen Woman Before.  
"Did Leapello mention anything  
about money?" asked Crown Attorney  
Greer.  
"No."  
"Of course you know what they were  
going to High Park for?"  
"No."

The witness stated that he thought  
he had seen the woman before in the  
ward.  
"Do you get many calls to take peo-  
ple to High Park at night?" queried  
Coroner Ricker. The witness replied  
in the negative.

That it is not uncommon for men  
and women to hire cars late at night  
and request to be driven to points on  
the outskirts of the city was the evi-  
dence given by Edgar Bridges, a  
chauffeur at the Toronto stand.

Frank Lombard, 61 Lapland avenue,  
another taxi-driver, declared he had  
quarrelled with Leapello about three  
months ago, but they were only  
estranged for a short time. He had  
never heard Leapello say he was  
frightened to drive.

Policeman C. E. Storey stated that  
he was patrolling College street on the  
morning of the murder when a car  
driven recklessly and at an excessive  
rate of speed passed him. Besides the  
driver, a man and woman were in the  
car. He took the number, and the car  
it was subsequently discovered be-  
longed to Leapello.

A number of other chauffeurs who  
knew the unfortunate man testified,  
but nothing of importance was estab-  
lished.

CANADIAN GUNS  
MASTER ENEMY'S

Fierce Artillery Contest Final-  
ly Silences German Bat-  
eries in Lens.

Canadian Army Headquarters, July  
27.—Our guns have at last definitely  
secured the upper hand on this part of  
the western front. The artillery ac-  
tions by which this has been done have  
been in progress for several days.

With the object of challenging our  
superiority in guns the enemy re-  
cently brought up a battery of artillery  
attached to a Prussian Guard division.  
These additional guns were given  
practically unlimited supplies of am-  
munition which they used for the en-  
tirement of our heavy artillery posi-  
tions.

They were good men, and a duel  
took place between them and our guns  
in the Lens and Avion sectors. It has  
ceased now.

The counter-battery work of the  
British and Canadian gunners proved  
so successful even the highly trained  
artillery men of the Prussian Guard,  
and their activity is now sub-normal.  
Perhaps the question of shell supply  
had something to do with the lessening  
of the enemy fire. It is certain  
that the Germans are finding an in-  
creasing difficulty in replacing the  
projectiles used so prodigiously in  
these bursts of activity.

JULIAN FRONT MARKED  
BY ARTILLERY DUELS

Italian Patrols Engage in Minor  
Attacks in Trentino.

Rome, July 27.—Today's official  
statement reads:  
"At Malga-Zurco, east of Lake  
Garda, and in the Cordevole and  
upper Boite valleys, our patrols suc-  
cessfully engaged the enemy tanks.  
Attempts by enemy detachments at  
the head of the Doga Valley, on  
Mount Rombon and at Dosso Fatti  
were repulsed by our advanced posts."  
The artillery duel, which was not  
very active on the Trentino front,  
continued violent yesterday at certain  
points on the Julian front, especially  
at Dosso Fatti and Castagnavizza.

CAPTURE THIEVES  
IN STOLEN AUTO

Police Successful After Thrill-  
ing Chase Thru City  
Streets.

After a thrilling chase in a motor car  
thru the streets of the west end during  
the early hours of this morning, four  
young men were arrested charged with  
theft of a motor car. The arrest was  
made until after Policeman Hayward  
of Ossington avenue station, had two  
broken and his arms and hands cut  
when he attempted to jump from the  
motor car to another while traveling at  
high speed.

The car was stolen from in front of  
the home of A. T. Brown, 82 Walker  
avenue. The thief was reported to the  
police, who notified the men on the beat  
of the number of the missing car. While  
patrolling the beat on Bloor street near  
Selwyn avenue, Policeman Hayward saw  
the stolen motor pass by. He stopped  
another car driven by A. Harbert, of  
Havelock street, and commanded it  
for the chase. When the men in the  
stolen car saw the policeman coming they  
increased the rate of speed. The police-  
man called to Reed, who was on  
duty near Lansdowne avenue, and they  
continued their chase. Going up Lan-  
sdowne avenue the motor in which the  
car and who are also held on charges  
and when they drove alongside of it Reed  
attempted to jump from the car to grab  
the driver of the stolen car, and in doing  
so missed his footing and fell on the  
pavement. His injuries are not serious.

British Kill Germans  
IN NO MAN'S LAND  
Sudden Barrage Cuts Off Foe  
Near Hennecourt in Flanders.

British Headquarters in France,  
July 27.—The Germans suffered heavy  
casualties as the result of the British  
artillery fire which was turned on to  
No Man's Land and farther back.  
Many German dead were seen lying in  
front of the British trenches.

The enemy artillery continued ex-  
cessively active near the coast all night.  
Nieuport was heavily shelled and  
a number of gas shells were  
thrown on Dunkirk. The British ar-  
tillery responded vigorously.

Farther down the line the Germans  
shelled Costevare and the back  
areas west of Wytschaete, as well as  
the trenches near Bullecourt and  
Arras.

NEUTRAL CARGO CORN  
SPOILS AT BALTIMORE

Eighteen Ships Lie at Anchor  
Awaiting License and Letters  
of Assurance.

Baltimore, July 27.—Eighteen neutral  
ships loaded with grain are an-  
chored off this port, with 50,000 tons  
of grain in their holds. Fifteen are  
Dutch and three Norwegian. Some  
have had their cargoes under hatches  
for a month, awaiting the license for  
United States Government, and  
letters of assurance from the British  
ambassador. The cargo of one neu-  
tral steamer, consisting of grain, was  
dumped overboard yesterday because  
it had spoiled. It consisted of about  
7,000 tons of corn.

BRITAIN BUSY ARMING  
HER MERCHANT VESSELS

London, July 27.—Three hundred  
British merchant vessels already have  
been armed each week, said T. J.  
MacNamara, financial secretary to  
the admiralty, in reply to a question  
in the house of commons today. He  
added that the government was mak-  
ing great efforts to get a maximum  
number of merchantmen armed as  
soon as possible.

SPAIN IN ALLIANCE  
WITH WARRING ALLIES

Washington, July 27.—An alliance  
between France, Italy, Spain, and  
Rumania will be formed at the secret  
alliance council in Paris, Rome de-  
putes to the Italian embassy stated  
today. This was the first mention of  
Spain, a neutral, as interested direct-  
ly in the council.

Embassy officials predicted this  
"Latin alliance" would be the fore-  
runner of a similar pact between the  
Anglo-Saxon peoples, to co-operate  
in preserving world peace in the  
future.
