MORE HIGH-PRESSURE STUDY.

Engineers to Take a Trip—Present State of Waterworks.

Deputy City Engineer Fellowes and Engineer McRae of the pumping station will shortly take a trip to Montreal and Philadelphia and other cities of the United States in order to gain more information on the best method of proceeding with the installation of the high pressure system of fire protection.

The city engineer's department reports that the water in the reservoir is gaining slowly on the consumption, and while the danger of a water famine will not be over until the back of winter is broken, the probabilities are strongly in favor of there being no interruption of the supply. In reply to the criticisms of Controller Hubbard and others, the engineers say that they are proceeding with the work confronting them in the best possible way.

The chief work is the laying of the new main to the reservoir, which is now being proceeded with on Bathurst-street. When a connection is made with the high level station, no danger will exist of any water famine in the city, as the combined mains would be sufficient to supply the demand in case the reservoir should be exhausted.
