WILL ARM THEM

Washington, March 9.—President Wilson, from a sick bed, today ordered the arming of American merchant ships against Germany's ruthless submarine warfare, and at the same time issued a proclamation calling an extra session of congress to meet April 16. The president's decision came suddenly late this afternoon, following the action of the senate yesterday in revising its rules to permit prompt action on important questions, and the submission of formal opinions by Secretary of State Lansing and Attorney-General Gregory that he has the power to arm merchantmen without action by congress.

MOTHERLAND TO CARE FOR CANADIAN GRAVES

Ottawa, March 9.—The motherland is providing for the burial in single graves of all her overseas sons who die in Great Britain. The land required is being acquired and it will be held in perpetuity at the cost of the imperial army funds. All possible care will be taken of the graves. All expenses of burial and of the future care of these silent witnesses to the loyalty, heroism and devotion of the empire's sons who die from wounds or sickness in the motherland, will be borne by the people of Great Britain. In a despatch from London received by the Canadian government announcing the above, it is stated that the British government is confident that it will be the unanimous wish of everyone in the United Kingdom that the British people should be privileged to undertake this charge and insure in this way that the last resting places of the dominion soldiers be not unworthy of their services and of the cause for which they have given their lives.

How the President Plans To Meet German Menace

Germany's supreme affront to the United States is contained in the amazing document of the German Foreign Minister, Dr. Zimmerman, addressed, through Count von Bernstorff to German Minister von Eckhardt, in Mexico City. In this communication Germany proposes that Mexico shall join with Japan in warring upon the United States and "reconquer" Mexico's lost territory in New Mexico, Texas and Arizona.

In the San Antonio Light, published in Texas, one of the States to be "reconquered" by Mexico, we read that "the people of Texas view with complacency the cold-blooded proposition by Germany that the State should become Mexican territory provided Mexico joins Germany and Japan in a war against the United States. They have no fear that such a thing will happen to them. They know that even though left entirely to their own resources, they will be able to avoid compulsory Mexican citizenship. It is conceivable that enormous Japanese and German armies advancing through Mexico might, for a time, occupy Texas, but Mexico would gain no population thereby. It can be asserted with quiet modesty and simple truth that when Texas had been overrun such Texans as were still living would be beyond or on the border fighting their way home."

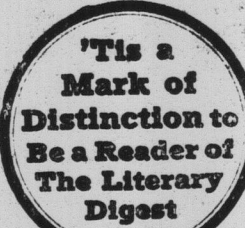
