Quite different from the news of yesterday is that which comes today from Italy. Yesterday's cables appeared to indicate an agreement between Italy and Austria. Today's news is much more warlike, and it is declared that Germans and Austrians are hastily leaving Italy.

HELP THE BELGIANS.

We must not forget the Belgians. There has just come to The Times from London, from the National Committee for Relief in Belgium, an appeal signed by the Lord Mayor of London, the Archbishop of Canterbury, Cardinal Bourne, Lord Lansdowne, Lord Rosebery, Lord Bryce, and a long list of other prominent men, asking the people throughout the British Empire to help the Belgians.



With the rapid exhaustion of the war and the heavy supplies there will probably be before harvest time 2,000,000 people in Belgium who must be fed and clothed solely by charity."

ELECTION PROBABLY POSTPONED?

Ottawa, May 6.—Premier Borden packed his fishing kit today and left for a holiday trip; his destination is unknown, but it is believed that it is either the Muskoka or the Gatineau lakes.

Yesterday afternoon Hon. Messrs. Rogers, Reid, Cochrane, and White waited on the premier at his home and urged an immediate election. It is believed that the prime minister urged that an election in spite of the flood of protests would be suicidal and it was decided to allow the matter to stand for the present.

This does not mean that the idea has been abandoned but that public opinion may be given an opportunity to cool off before any further announcement may be expected.
