PETERHEAD, Scotland, Nov. 2.— Going ashore in a dense fog early yesterday the British steamer Cairavon, 5245 tons gross, owned by the Cairn-Noble company, of Newcastle, England, on a trip from Leith, Scotland, to Montreal, is a total wreck on the rocks about half a mile south of Buchan

about half a mile south of Buchan Ness, Aberdeenshire.

The majority of the crew were asleep and when the vessel went ashore they hurriedly put oilskins over their night clothes and ran on deck. A heavy sea pounded the steamer on the rocks. Just before she broke in two the members of the crew succeeded in reaching the rocks from the bow by means of a rope ladder. Four of the seamen then scaled the dangerous cliffs and obtained a cliff ladder from a coastguard station in the vicinity, enabling them to rescue their comrades.

MOSCOW, Nov.—Soviet Russia has resorted to a novel method of solving its orphan problem. The Mascow Soviet yesterday decided to place two orphan children in each peasant family in the villages, offering as a recompense for their support a small grant of land or from five to ten rubles monthly for each child. The children will be provided with clothing and given ten rubles each for their further needs. Then local village Soviets will act as foster fathers for the orphans, while in the village homes, making provision for their education along communistic lines. LONDON, Nov. 2.—A great railroad through the Khyber Pass, giving India a new measure of security, was opened today after five year's effort by the British engineers and thousands of native workers.
