Make \$50,000 a Year For 24-Year-Old Girl Designing Ruffles

New York, Oct. 30.—Dreams of childhood are making \$50,000 a year for a 24-year-old girl.
They are making her one of the country's most successful business women with a salary that the President of the country was glad to get 15 years ago.
Yet Miss Carolyn Nunder isn't quite satisfied.
She feels that she isn't getting ahead fast enough.
"That, I suppose," she says smiling, "is the impatience of youth. But it's in youth that success begins."
"The dreams that we have when we are young are the index to what we should do when we are old. They show where our natural talents lie before we have been warped by educators and dictated to by our elders."
In Miss Nunder's childhood these dreams were of—ruffles!
And it has been with ruffles that she has made her success.
"When I was a youngster," she says, "I had a nondescript china doll. Part of its nose had been bumped off and one eye had vanished completely, owing to too many devoted washings. But I loved that doll and tried to make up for its deformities by dressing it prettily. I would trick up its clothes with ruffles, and soon my doll was known as the best dressed doll in the neighborhood."
"Then a few years went by and folks said Carolyn was too old to play with dolls. So she started making ruffles for herself. And soon she had the reputation of being the best dressed girl among her friends."
"When she was 20 her older sister became ill, and there was danger that her younger sister would have to be taken out of school. Carolyn decided that she was going to help the family out of its difficulties."
"The answer came in a flash," she says. "Ruffles!"
"I began making clothes for other persons. It was hard going at first. Sometimes I was trying to make seams meet and sometimes I was trying to make ends meet."

"habitat group" to go in the very small museum at Oakland, Cal. Mr. Snow has also reported the killing of six hippopotami, for one group in East and South Africa, the hippo is fast going out. CARE OF FOOTWEAR.
Good leather is a wonderful material and has nature-given qualities which make it peculiarly suited for footwear. But proper treatment must be given, says the Shoe and Leather Journal. The wearer ought to change from wet shoes as soon as possible. Wet leather is liable to stretch out of shape. Stitches cut through it easily. Wet soles and heels wear away rapidly. Leather burns readily, and much more readily when wet. Do not put leather footwear near heaters, radiators, or hot gratings. Shoes, especially if damp, will burn even on the feet at a temperature which is not uncomfortable to the wearer. If the sole

upper leather cracks, the probability is that it has been burned.
Shoes ought never to be worn unless thoroughly dry. When leather footwear becomes wet and is dried too quickly and without proper attention, it shrinks, becoming hard and misshapen. To dry wet boots and shoes, wash out all adhering mud and grit with tepid water, and in the case of work or rough shoes, at once oil or grease them. Straighten the counters, heels, vamp and tops to the proper shape and put the shoes on shoe trees or stuff them with crumpled paper, which helps to hold the shape and shortens the drying period. Then set them aside to dry at the normal temperature of the room.
The United States Government offers this excellent advice:
"An economical plan is to have two pairs (of shoes) which are worn on alternate days, thus permitting each pair to become thoroughly dry between the periods of wearing them."
Two pairs of shoes worn alternately will give more than twice the wear of a single pair worn every day.

Big Game Killing In Africa Assailed

Dr. Hornaday Makes Vigorous Protest on "Ruthless Slaughter."

New York, Oct. 31.—The wholesale slaughter of big game in the jungles of Africa has brought some species near extinction and has resulted in great criticism of American zoological collectors. It was declared yesterday in an appeal sent to members of the Association of American Museums asking them to protest against the latest big game hunting expedition. The appeal

was made public by Dr. William T. Hornaday, director of the New York Zoological Society and a trustee of the Permanent Wild Life Protection Fund. The Permanent Wild Life Protection Fund is particularly aggrieved by what it describes as the ruthless killing of big game in Africa by Henry A. Snow, who made his first expeditions there under the sponsorship of the Museum of Oakland, Cal., and is now on his way to Africa to obtain additional specimens. The killing by Snow and his son, according to the letter sent to members of the Association of American Museums, has caused protests in South Africa, in England and in other parts of the world. It acknowledges that "the world is sympathetic toward genuine museum collectors," to whom it concedes many privileges, but it sets up as a rigid rule that species of rap-

idly approaching extinction must be held "absolutely immune" from molestation.
The letter says: "Mr. Snow himself has furnished nearly all the evidence that we need in this exhibit of his acts. His published articles and his cruel and sometimes repulsive pictures, coupled with the evidence of public feeling in Africa, in England and the United States, are quite sufficient to enable any one to form opinions."
"First, I accuse Mr. Snow of a capital zoological outrage against an important, valuable and almost extinct mammal species of South Africa—the great southern white rhinoceros."
"I specify that, according to Snow's own published statement, in Natal, he killed four out of the only remaining twenty-four individuals (or eleven about) of that species—for an alleged
