ON A WALKING TOUR OF WORLD

Swiss Physician Covers 35,000 Miles—Cost Him \$40,000—To Italy and Africa Now.

Milan, May 18.—(Associated Press, by mail.) Dr. Massimo Armando Leuret, aged 36, a Swiss physician, has arrived here after walking 35,000 miles in both old and new worlds. He asserts that his tour took him around the globe, commencing on January 1, 1914, and cost him \$40,000.

He says he left Switzerland, going north to Germany, Poland and Russia. He was in the last named country when war began and continued the journey across Russia to Siberia. He visited China and Japan and later crossed the Pacific to America. He claims to have traversed both North and South America on foot. His trip from the Pacific coast to New York was made alternately in Canada and the United States.

When he got to Switzerland he decided that he had not yet seen Italy nor Africa, and has commenced now his journeys through them.
