Both fore and aft they will be subject to the receipt of a film or of a "hello."

It is the Marconi Wireless Company who are responsible for this determination to give the newspaper proprietors and editors no rest even upon the North Atlantic billows when they may be wishing they were on the terra firma of a Fleet street office. The Victorian will have on board a powerful apparatus for continuous telegraphic, so that communications to either side may be despatched and received by the passengers quite irrespective of the routine and emergent claims of a ship at sea, which has to be ready to listen for and receive signals that may come from distressed ships or from ships that wish to be reported.

In addition to the telegraphic facilities—which in themselves are facilities—the Victorian will be fitted with a telephone set, which will also make use of the continuous wave. With this equipment on board it will be possible for the station at St. John's, Nfld., to communicate with the ship verbally at a distance of 1,500 miles away.

Establish New Station

For the purpose of establishing this daily communication, the Marconi Company are establishing a new station at St. John's, Nfld., on Signal Hill, another on the Cornish coast in England, and the third on the Victorian. As far as the telephonic apparatus is concerned, it is said to be one hundred per cent. more powerful than that which was used in the first trans-Atlantic experiment. Arrangements have been made to send out a daily news bulletin from the Marconi station at Newcastle, N. B., by the continuous wave telegraphy, and the same is to be done from the English side.

As the Imperial Press Conference at Ottawa will devote a good part of their discussions to the most modern, expeditious and effective means of transmitting news despatches around the empire, it is only natural that the Marconi Telegraph Company should lay their services out to arrange this demonstration. The Victorian is expected to arrive at Sydney, N. S., on July 27.

HAS HOUSE AND LOT ON TOP OF SKYSCRAPER

The composer of "Canary Cottage," Earl Carroll, song writer, playwright, producer and stage manager, has devised a unique scheme whereby he lives in the heart of New York yet enjoys all the delights of tennis, gardening and such pleasures as are usually connected with suburban residence. He has leased the roof of the Godfrey building, 20 stories high, on the corner of Forty-seventh street and Seventh avenue, and there has built a \$60,000 bungalow of the California type.
