ANXIOUS TO TAKE CHANCES IN LOTTERY

Rome, Aug. 16.—(Associated Press)—Professor Luigi Luzzatti, former premier, has received thousands of letters from America which demonstrate the love of Americans for "taking a chance."

This avalanche of correspondence, which the aged statesman showed the correspondent tonight, was filed with checks for amounts varying from one dollar to one hundred dollars, the aggregate running up into the thousands.

The letters implored the former premier to reserve tickets in the gigantic international lottery, which the letters asserted he is conducting to pay the cost of the war.

"The proposal for an international lottery was widely published in the French press," he said. "Such a scheme was shown me by an Italian some months ago, but I am not identified with it. In fact, at the time that I was interviewed regarding the plan I strongly disapproved of it. I hope Americans will forgive my inability to satisfy their appetite for a good game."

Farmers Nominate Liberal.

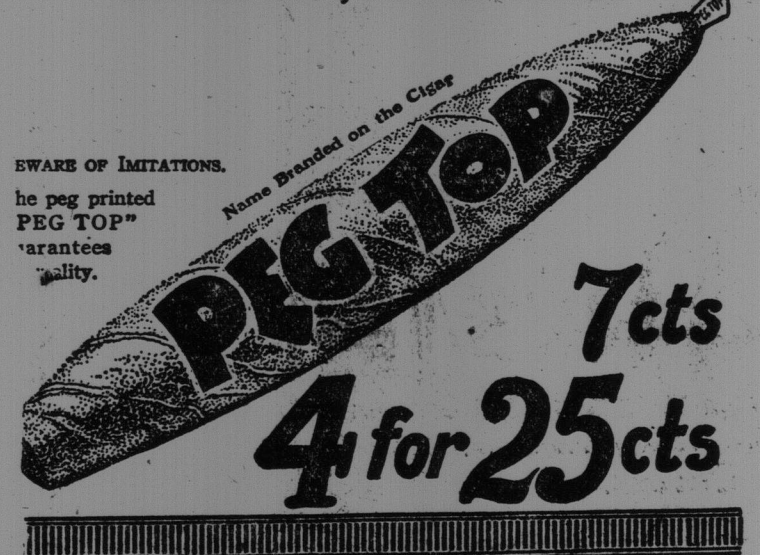

"BULLET" JOE BUSH SUSPENDED BY RED SOX

Says He Was Injured in Game and Demands His Salary or Release.

Boston, Aug. 14.—"Bullet" Joe Bush, Red Sox pitcher, has a grievance against the management of the Boston club. Just before the team left for the west he received notice that he was suspended for the remainder of the season.

"Owing to your inability to get into condition," the notice read, "you are suspended for the remainder of the season without pay," etc. Enclosed was a check in payment of his salary up to date.

Bush refused to accept the check unless he was also given his unconditional release, and since as he claims, he was injured while playing for the Boston club, he intends to claim his salary in full, and will report daily at Fenway Park for the remainder of the season, or until such time as the club sees fit to give him his release.

GIANTS DRAW BIG CROWDS IN WEST

An indication of just how solidly baseball has come back after two comparatively lean years because of the war is to be found in the unofficial attendance figures of the Giants' trip through the west.

A conservative estimate of the total number of fans who were drawn through the turnstiles by McGraw's men in Pittsburgh, Cincinnati, St. Louis and Chicago is 155,000.

The Giants began their invasion with a double-header in Pittsburgh which attracted about 15,000 rooters. The following day 10,000 turned out for another double bill. On the last day of their sojourn in the Smoky City threatening weather kept the attendance down to about 3,500.

The opening day of the big series in Cincinnati saw 18,000 bugs holding down seats in the stands at Redland Field. Twenty-two thousand turned out the second day, and on the third, a week ago Sunday, the attendance record at the park was shattered when 32,121 fans trooped through the portals.

In St. Louis where interest in the Cardinals for the three game series was about 3,500.

Chicago fans were attracted in great numbers to the games played by the Giants in that city. Twelve thousand saw the first contest, 20,000 cheered the Cubs to victory in the second and the Sunday crowd was about 25,000.
