

Mr. Burchell then moved to recommend the matter to Professor Sexton to have arrangements made for the showing of these pictures in the Casino Theatre.

Mr. Lucas, in seconding this motion said that he was in favor of the motion pictures and he believed that the time would come, if it had not already arrived, when motion pictures would be the greatest educational factor known. "They will not only be shown in theatres, but our public schools."


