

## PREMIER HEAD OF GOODROADS ASSN.

### Convention Adopts Policy of Federal Aid to the Provinces.

St. Andrews-by-the-Sea, June 26.—Hon. Peter J. Veniot, Premier of New Brunswick, was chosen President of the Canadian Good Roads Association at its annual meeting here in connection with the eleventh conference.

Premier Veniot was given a hearty reception when he assumed the chair. In a few words he said that he appreciated the honor that had been accorded him, and the responsibilities which he had accepted. "I appreciate also," he said, "the good which this association can do for Canada, as well as to promote a better understanding between the different provinces of the Dominion."

The meeting unanimously adopted a resolution recommending that the resolutions committee, reaffirming its belief in the principle of Federal aid to the provinces for road purposes, and that the executive be commissioned to arrange for the presentation of the claims of the provinces before the Dominion cabinet.

Resolutions of thanks to Lieutenant Governor and Mrs. Todd, Premier and Mrs. Veniot, Mayor and Mrs. C. S. Everett, of St. Andrews, Mayor and Mrs. W. G. DeWolfe, of St. Stephen, the ladies' committee, the press of Canada, the New Brunswick papers, who reported the convention, and the Canadian Press, to the retiring officers and directors, to the management of the Algonquin Hotel, and to all those who assisted in the programme of the convention, were unanimously adopted.

The report of the secretary-treasurer gave receipts as \$17,487 after all expenses were paid, a surplus of \$57.44. Assets totalled \$1,683.53 with no liabilities.

**Better Roads.**  
The retiring president, Russell T. Kelley, in his closing address expressed his pleasure at the good work accomplished during the year, and expressed the opinion that the improvement of the roads of the Dominion had resulted in a great increase in tourist traffic.

He stressed the necessity of the continuation of Federal aid, and particularly for the Maritime and Western Provinces.

Invitations for the conference next year were extended to the cities of Quebec and Windsor, Ont., and the matter was left in the hands of the new executive.

The annual dinner last evening proved a most successful function, and the pleasure of those present was greatly enhanced by several solos by Madame Lugin-Pahay.

R. T. Kelley, retiring president, presided. Besides Premier and other officials who spoke to the toast to our Governments were Hon. J. A. MacDonald, of P. E. Island, and Hon. W. R. Clapp, of Manitoba. Mayor H. F. McGrath, of St. George, and S. L. Squire, chairman of the directors of C. G. R. A., also spoke.

Mayor Potts, of St. John, proposed the toast to the guests, during which he made an appeal for the use of the port of St. John by the people of Canada.

Col. H. C. Boyden, of Chicago, and Col. W. D. Soper, of Boston, replied. The toast to the Press was proposed by W. E. Scully, M. L. A. of New Brunswick, and responded to by R. H. Parson, of Montreal.

**Bring Sea Air To London Streets**

London, June 27.—While hundreds of people were hurrying to the seaside for the week-end many thousands cubic feet of sea air came to London—in long black cylinders. The sea air is being given to London at the Savoy Hotel, particularly in the ballroom.

The experiment is being tried not so much to cool the room, for that is achieved by an ice-cooled air system, but to provide dancers with additional vitality during lethargic weather.

Twelve large cylinders, each containing 2,000 cubic feet of compressed ozone, arrived and some of it was discharged in the ballroom. The cylinders are kept near the wine cellar.

It is hoped that dancers will feel its benefit. Eight cylinders were filled at Bridlington, Yorkshire, and four at Weston-super-Mare, on the Bristol Channel, distant about 200 and 120 miles from London.

**Says It's Hard To Get Clergymen**

Dublin, June 27.—The Protestant Bishop of Clogher, Dr. MacManaway, has struck a note of alarm in referring to the growing shortage of clergymen in the Church of Ireland. He has five vacant parishes in his diocese and "not a single suitable man in view for any of them."

In his university days in Trinity College, he says, there were about 100 men preparing for the ministry. Now there are only from 30 to 35.

"It requires," the bishop declared, "but a simple calculation to show that if this state of things continue for a comparatively short number of years the work of the church would come to a stop."

**TRAVIS NOT GUILTY ON ARSON CHARGE**

Jury Brings in Verdict for the Defendant Without Leaving Room.

John Travis, who was charged with arson, was discharged yesterday afternoon in the Circuit Court after the jury had brought in a verdict of not guilty, without leaving their seats.

When the court resumed after the noon recess, E. J. Henneberry, counsel for the defence, asked that the case be withdrawn from the jury on the ground that no evidence had been submitted to show that Travis was guilty.

In his charge to the jury, Mr. Justice Barry said there had not been any evidence of Travis being the guilty person and he would say to the jury that they must bring in a verdict without leaving the court room. The jury conferred for about two minutes and then announced a verdict of not guilty.
