REPORT FOR 1880.

The very first note of this report must be one of profound thankfulness to God for the restoration to health and active duty of our dear President, Mrs. Murray, after four months of illness at close of last and early part of the present year.

Also for the spared life and return to our midst of our beloved Secretary, Mrs. Blair, after an absence at the Pacific Coast of about a year in search of health.

We are glad to report a very pleasant, rather progressive year in point of interest and profit, partly due to the individual proving from scripture of selected subjects, and the reading of choice articles bearing chiefly upon the objects of our work—Missions. Added to this we have twenty-six subscribers to the Monthly Letter Leaflet, only one cent a month, containing letters directly from our Missionaries in all parts of the world, including our own Northwest, which contains information always of the most interesting character to the members of our now wide-spread Society. Our membership, however, remains much about the same. During the year three valued members left for other centres of usefulness, while five others have joined us, making our number at this date 45.
