DEPARTMENTAL ORDER NO. 1 CUSTOMS DEPARTMENT.

Ottawa, 31st December 1867.

NOTICE is hereby given that His Excellency the Governor General in Council has been pleased, under the authority vested in him, to order and direct that horses, horned cattle, sheep, pigs and other animals, poultry and fancy birds, when specially imported for the improvement of stock in Canada, whether by Agricultural Societies or private individuals, shall, until otherwise ordered, be imported without being liable to the payment of Customs duty, and should be entered accordingly.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR GENERAL IN COUNCIL.

ON the recommendation of the Honorable the Minister of Customs, and under and in virtue of the authority given and conferred by the Act passed during the present session of the Legislature, intituled: "An Act respecting the Customs," His Excellency in Council has been pleased to make the following Regulations:

REGULATION.

"In addition to the Warehousing Ports mentioned in the Act passed during the present session of the Parliament of Canada, and intituled: "An Act respecting the Customs," the Ports mentioned in the annexed lists and being in the Provinces of Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, and which are now Warehousing Ports, are hereby continued as such Warehousing Ports, and are hereby declared to be so accordingly.

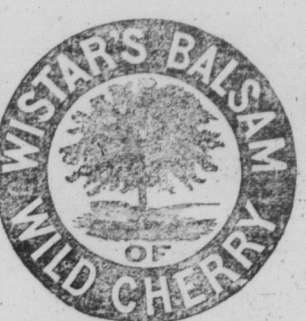
