- Q. Up to the Council Chamber?
- A. Yes, and his Missus, and it made a big load, and myself-
- Q. Yes.
- A. And that is the time he sold it.
- Q. Were you right there when it was sold?
- A. I don't remember. They made a bargain there, I know that they sold the land. I could not say that I was a witness.

 There was a lot of people there and they could do without me.
- Q. You dont know the price? A. No.
- Q. Did you go home with Angus Prince?
- A. I came home with the Missus, not Angus Prince.
- Yes, he told me everything was all right and he sold the land because I took home a lot of provisions. That is all I know about it.

Mr. Heap; -

- Q. There is a deed registered, dated in '73, did Angus Prince move off the land after that?
- A. He stayed there for sometime.
- Q. How long?
- A. Well, it might be two or three years I guess.

Commissioner-

- Q. Stayed on the land two or three years after this?
- A. Yes.

Mr. Heap-

- Q. Who lived on the land after he went from it?
- A. It was a man, Thomas Favel.
- Q. Who lived on it fter that?
- A. Mrs. Widow Favel lives there yet.

Mr. Clarke;-

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Q. And they are Treaty Indians, are they? A. Yes.
