ELEVEN STREET GARS WRECKED BY MOB

Eighteen Men Injured During Riot in Toronto-Police Powerless

For two hours a mob of several thou-sand persons surged back and forth on the principal business thoroughfares, de-molishing every street car that came within reach and completely tying up

The disorderly scenes followed a mass meeting at Massey hall. Two weeks ago the Toronto Street Railway Company inthe Toronto Street Railway Company installed pay-as-you-enter cars on the principal lines. Much dissatisfaction developed over the innovation. It was claimed that the cars were not adapted to that kind of service. Protests in writing and by personal appeal became so numerous that Mayor Geary and the board of control decided to call a mass meeting at

The moo showed consideration for the gassengers, allowing them in almost every instance to leave the car before attacking it. An order was finally issued to stop running cars into the down-town district, and not until it had been carried out were there any signs of restoration of order.

Toward midnight the crowd gradually withdow from the streets, and at 12.30 the street car service was resumed.
