THE SEAL FISHER

The Result of His Season's Work The Result of His Season's Work is Largely a Gambie.

As maritime adventurers, Nova Scotians can hold up their end with any race as people on the face of the earth. They have sailed the seven seas in search of riches. They have fitted out and commanded treasure trove circuit one. For a number of years a facet of Nova Scotia schooners scoured the islands and rooks of the southerniaess in quest of the pelt of the fur-bearing seal. And to-day Nova Scotia is Newfoundland's only rival in the chase for the prolific hair seal.

For the past few weeks the sealing facet has been fitting out for the cruise fleet has been fitting out for the cruise to the sealing "grounds." The steamer Seal is Noys, Sootie's representative in the expedition and the Gulf of St. in the expedition and the Gulf of St.
Lawrence, is the objective point. The
Seal fits out at Halifax and then sails
for Channel, Newfoundland, from
which place the start is made. For
the law says, that no vessel shall
leave for the ice until a flag has been
unfurled to the breeze on Oustons
Hill, Channel. Therefore, all the sealing craft seemble there and endeavor
to make the most advantageous start
possible.

possible.

The hoisting of the starting flag is a great stent at Channel. It means much the fine thousands of men who form the crews of the vessels and it form the crews of the vessels and it means much to the owners of the vessels. To be the first at the sealing grounds may mean a full fare and a quick trip. So the starting of the fleet is far more exciting than the starting of a horse race. The hills are made and about Channel present an animated appearance. Men, women and children crowd their slopes on the day of the start. They are anxious to see the get-away. They seemble on the hill tops and hill sides before the break of day. For this race means their bread and butter. The spectators are the fathers and mothers, the wives and children and the sweethearts of the men on the ships. A successful voyage means a full larder, a new dress, a wedding. No wonder the skippers jockey for advantageous positions. The start is

No wonder the skippers jocksy for savantageous positions. The start is generally a fair one. Five minutes after the flag has been broken to the wind the eight or ten great steamers are moving, almost nose to nose. Then they begin to separate. It is "the survival of the fittest." The steamer with the greatest speed forger shead and in an hour's time they, have formed a regular procession. Later they form a line of sinking Hülls, but not until they have disappeared entirely from sight do the watchers leave the hills sight do the watchers leave the hills and seek their homes, there to wai the return, be it one of success or one

the return, be it one of success or one of failure.

But to follow the ships. The Seal goes well slong with the bunch. Cape Race is rounded and they steer to the northward. The ice is soon sighted by the man in the "crow's nest." Closer and closer comes the ice. At last the steamers are in it. There is no speeding now. It is one continuous, pounding at the great ice cakes. This may continue for fifty or for seventy hours. The steamer that is lucky enough to find a channel has an advantage over the rest of the fleet. The pressure of the ice against the ship's sides is sometimes tremendous. Here is where one of the greatest dangers lie. Vessels have been completely cut in two by the ice jam, the decks and upper portion sitting upright on top of the ice, while the hull goes to the bottom. All this time a sharp look-out is kept for the seals. Sometimes they are sighted early in the chase. Other times they are not seen until the fleet

has gone a long distance, to the Mag-dalen Islands, perhaps, and some-times they are "missed" entirely. It times they are "missed" entirely. It is a great game of chance with stomachs and capital at stake.

Everyone is in the gamble. The men work "on shares." The bigger the luck the bigger the pay. It is also no luck no pay. The ships may be insured, but nobody insures the sealer. Sometimes he makes big money. Sometimes he makes small money and sometimes he makes main money and sometimes he makes mone at all. Yet he will go back next year and the year after, for the gambling spirit dies hard.—W. D. Taunton in Saturday Night.

Is This a Record?

He adds that Canada will certainly have fifteen million people in less than ten years, especially when we consider that in two years time all the machinery of the Grand Trunk Pacific and the Canadian Northern Raitway will be added to that now in motion by the Canadian Pacific Railway, bringing immigrants to the Dominion.
