APRIL 8.—Hon. Mr. Blair committed the bill amending the highway act of 1886, Mr. Morrissey in the chair. Mr. Blair said this bill had been introduced by Mr. Emmerson and there were several amendments suggested by the municipalities committee, which amendments he will read.

Mr. Palmer explained why amendments had been made by the municipalities committee and spoke of the necessity of some changes in the present law.

Mr. Blair explained that the bill provided that in case of the illness or absence from the province of the head of any of the departments of the government the lieutenant governor may by order in council nominate and appoint any member of the executive council who is himself head of a department, acting head of the department of such member, during the illness or absence, and such acting head of the department shall have and possess all the powers and authorities vested in or exercisable by the head of the department for whom he is so acting.
