A Third Time He Declines His Sessional Indemnity

OTTAWA, July 23.—For the third year in sucession Senator Wood of Westmorland, N. B., has declined to accept his sessional indemnity of \$2,500. This unique refusal of a member of parliament to accept money is due to the senator's consistent objection to the increase of the sessional indemnity.

from \$1,500 to \$2,500. He maintains that the members of parliament should be willing to serve their country in a legislative capacity without asking a saliary therefor, and that they should only claim an indemnity to cover living expenses, etc., while at Ottawa.

Acting on that principle he hasdrawn this session only "board money" at the rate of about \$800 per year. The balance now due him stands to his credit in the public accounts. In the end it will probably be collected by his executor.
