COUNCIL DID NOT TAKE NOTE ON MOTION TO RUN FERRY TILL MIDNIGHT

West Side Residents Considered in Dying Hours of Council But No Action is Taken — Name of Sheffield Street Changed to Broad View—Reports Received from Various Boards.

At the meeting of the common council held last evening the proposition to increase the pay of the ferry employees was turned down, and the question of having the boats run at midnight, leaving the West Side at 11:50 and the east side at twelve on the last trip was discussed, but no definite action was taken. An extension of the water and sewer systems out Adelaide road was ordered and other important matters dealt with.

The report of the safety board was then taken up. The first recommendation to offer a number of lots on Pitt, Duke and Broad streets for sale at public auction was opposed by Ald. Hayes, Codner and others, but was adopted.

The next section recommended that Randolph and Baker be offered the fee simple in lots Nos. 7 and 9, and in the Limestone Rock and park, of the Reserve together with the northern end of the school lot for \$12,000.

The next section recommended that the tender of Canadian Consolidated Rubber Co., to place rubber tires on the horse wagons at a cost of \$391.74 be accepted.

The report of the board of works was then taken up. The recommendation to change the name of Sheffield street was adopted, and on motion of Ald. J. B. Jones it was named Broadview.

A resolution authorizing the city engineer to repair the face of the North Wharf at the western end at an estimated cost of \$400 was adopted. A recommendation that the question of laying a sidewalk on South Wharf and Ward street be laid over till all the merchants interested signed the petition, caused some discussion.

The next section recommended that the ferry employees be given an increase of pay. Ald. Scully moved that the ferry service be extended half an hour, the boat leaving the east side at midnight for her last trip.

Ald. Potts said he was in a peculiar position. Only a little while ago he had voted to increase the fare, now he was asked to vote an increase of pay. Ald. Hayes said it was charged in the legislature that the extravagance of the east side aldermen had made it necessary to increase the fare.

He thought Ald. Potts and Scully Waring had improved the ferry service a good deal. He agreed that the increase of pay would amount to \$2,500. He would like to give the men more money, but there was no provision for extra pay.

Ald. J. B. Jones said he did not think the citizens were unreasonable. The public had practically voted to pay high salaries to inexperienced men to run the city, and might not object to giving the ferry employees who were experienced men, an increase of pay.

Ald. Scully thought the city should run the ferries till midnight. Continued on page four.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS. A person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the location, and the Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.
