PRACTICAL EXAMPLE OF CHURCH UNION

Presbyterian and Methodist Congregations in Chatham Unite for the Summer—How Independent Members Stand

Chatham, June 24.—The elections are over and the result throughout the province must be very gratifying to Premier Flemming and the members of his government as well as the friends of good government regardless of party affiliations and the Conservative party all over Canada. Many persons have asserted during the last four years that owing to the voracious system of favoritism and graft prevailing so long under the Blair-Tweedie-Pugsley regime the electors would not stand for honest administration and a more efficient government.

They have their answer. There was some smashing done, it is true, but the opposition got it and not the government. There is an idea abroad in the minds of the people that provincial and federal are kept in power too long, that the interests of the people would be better served by more frequent changes of administration, because any party too long entrusted with the reins of power become the masters instead of the servants of the people. It appears, however, that the very best, in fact the only way for any government or party to retain the confidence of the people by deserving it, is to be honest and to have the ability of the Fleming government was amply proven by the late majority rolled up for the government candidates in nearly every constituency where polls were held on the 20th inst.

Northumberland has maintained her reputation of being an unknown quantity in provincial politics ever since the notorious "Northumberland Deal" of 25 or 30 years ago, so long in fact that it is remembered only by the older people.

When after repeated efforts the opposition failed to secure a ticket and at the eleventh hour the independent trio were nominated it was regarded as a joke all over the country but the result of the vote on the 20th proved to be serious. Two of the government candidates who were defeated.

There is much speculation here as to the position of the independent trio. It will occupy in relation to the government. Their friends say they are in a position to demand and will receive any recognition to which they are entitled as supporters of the government, while on the other hand it is claimed that they are their own masters and that they will officiate during the absence of Mr. McLean.

The feelings between these two congregations have always been most cordial and friendly and it is hoped that this temporary union will not only increase the friendly relations now existing but pave the way for more permanent union in the future.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS. Any person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old, may become a homesteader in any of the available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any Agency where the homesteader is a resident, son, daughter, brother or sister residing in the district.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each three calendar months. Homesteader may live within five miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, or on a homestead of at least 40 acres, or on a homestead of at least 20 acres, or on a homestead of at least 10 acres, or on a homestead of at least 5 acres, or on a homestead of at least 2 acres.

Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption lot, or on a farm of at least 80 acres from date of homestead entry, including the time required to earn homestead patent, and cultivate fifty acres each year.
