

STRIKES BLOW AT BRIBING IN GERMANY

Berlin, May 7.—The new military dirigible Zeppelin No. 5 has been equipped with muffers which are expected to eliminate the thunderous noise of the engines. The cost of the 700 horsepower motors on previous Zeppelins could be heard for miles which naturally decreased the value of the craft for scouting purposes. With this noise stilled, it will be possible for the dirigibles to reconnoiter by night or in foggy weather without being discovered and without running the risk of becoming a target for the enemy's guns.

Docks Employees.

The highest court of the Hanseatic cities has just rendered a decision that is calculated to strike a serious blow at the widespread practice of bribing commercial and technical employees in Germany. The North-German Lloyd steamship company, having learned that the Shantung Coal Company in China was paying the line's engineers a "rake-off" of 25 cents a ton on the coal purchased for its steamers, docked the wages of the men by the full amount, claiming that this money rightfully belonged to it. The engineers brought suit to recover, and the court sustained the steamship company.

Big Dividends.

The Colonial Mining Company will pay for 1913 a dividend of only 2,500 per cent, compared with 38,000 per cent for the previous year. The company which is still able, despite such a radical cut, to pay the largest dividend of any German enterprise, is the original corporation formed to exploit the diamond discoveries in German Southwest Africa and, including the dividend now to be declared, will have paid in the four years of its existence total dividends of 11,200 per cent. Its founder, Herr Stauch, then division superintendent of a railway in the colony, has risen in these few years from simple railway official to one of Germany's big multi-millionaires.

One Year Off.

A young barber of Brunswick has won release from one of the two years' service usually required in the German army by proficiency in hair dressing and wig making. This privilege has heretofore been granted only for scholarship, but it was recently decided that young men showing particular excellence in different trades should also be entitled to it. The barber of Brunswick is one of the first to qualify.

Emperor as Business Man.

Emperor William has just given his consent for the sale of his spinning-mill located at Landeshut, Silesia. The mill which employs about 400 persons, is by no means a failure, for its profits last year were equal to six per cent on the capital invested, but apparently this has not been a sufficient reward for the Imperial manufacturer. He is making more money out of his factory at Kadinen where he produces tiling, fancy bricks and other clay products.

NEWCASTLE NOTES

Newcastle, May 7.—The new town clock, agitated for years by the local Board of Trade, is being installed in the post office tower by the Dominion government this week. The bell weighs 850 lbs. The installation is being superintended by A. Poyas of St. John.

Daniel Mullin, of Meadows, North West Miramichi, died yesterday morning in Chatham hospital three days after undergoing an operation. He leaves a wife and several children.

Three Swedish families have come to Nordin to settle.

The funeral of Mrs. Hugh Clanny, who died on the 5th, aged 88, was held in St. James' cemetery today. Rev. S. J. MacArthur officiating. Mrs. Clanny leaves one son and six daughters.

REV. MR. DRUMM LECTURES ON ISLE OF MAN

Intensely interesting address before members of the Women's Canadian Club—Last of season.

The members of the Women's Canadian Club were privileged to hear a lecture of much more than ordinary interest last evening in the York assembly rooms when Rev. T. P. Drumm, B. D. of Campbellton, addressed the club on "The Isle of Man."

Rev. Mr. Drumm is a native of the Isle of Man and his remarks last evening thus contained a greater interest for the audience. The speaker has a pleasing delivery and freely interspersed his remarks with anecdotes that enlivened the story and made the time pass almost too quickly. At the close of the lecture, which extended over nearly two hours, few in the audience realized that they had been attentive so long.

Mr. Drumm had a very pleasing manner of bringing home the points of his narrative and he had the gift of making his audience feel perfectly contented.

The speaker was introduced by Mrs. E. Atherton Smith, the president of the club. Mr. Drumm expressed his appreciation for being asked to speak to the members but he had hardly expected to meet such a large group of women. In opening his address he referred to the location of the Isle of Man and pointed out that it was situated in the Irish Sea, had a population of about 50,000 and was 12 miles wide and 33 miles long.

He explained the points of attraction at the chief port, Douglas, and showed views of the city which is the haunt of many British tourists. He showed the large boarding houses where these tourists stayed and the different amusements.

Other towns and places of interest were shown and explained in very comprehensive terms.

Buildings and places of historic interest were illustrated and their story told.

The whole lecture was a treat and following as it did closely after the lecture of the president, Mrs. Smith, a few days ago when she illustrated by word and picture the many points of interest in London, was received with every tribute of satisfaction.

At the close of the address Mr. Drumm called on the audience to join with him in singing the fishermen's evening hymn.

A vote of thanks, moved by Mrs. Manning W. Doherty and seconded by Mrs. W. E. McIntyre was tendered the speaker by the president, Judge Forbes and A. M. Belding also spoke favorably of the fine address given by the speaker of the evening.

The meeting was the closing one of the season and Mrs. Smith urged on the members the need of greater effort for next season. The club now had the largest membership of any sister organization in Canada in proportion to population and she hoped that the members would do mission work throughout the summer so that next season the club would have the largest membership in Canada.

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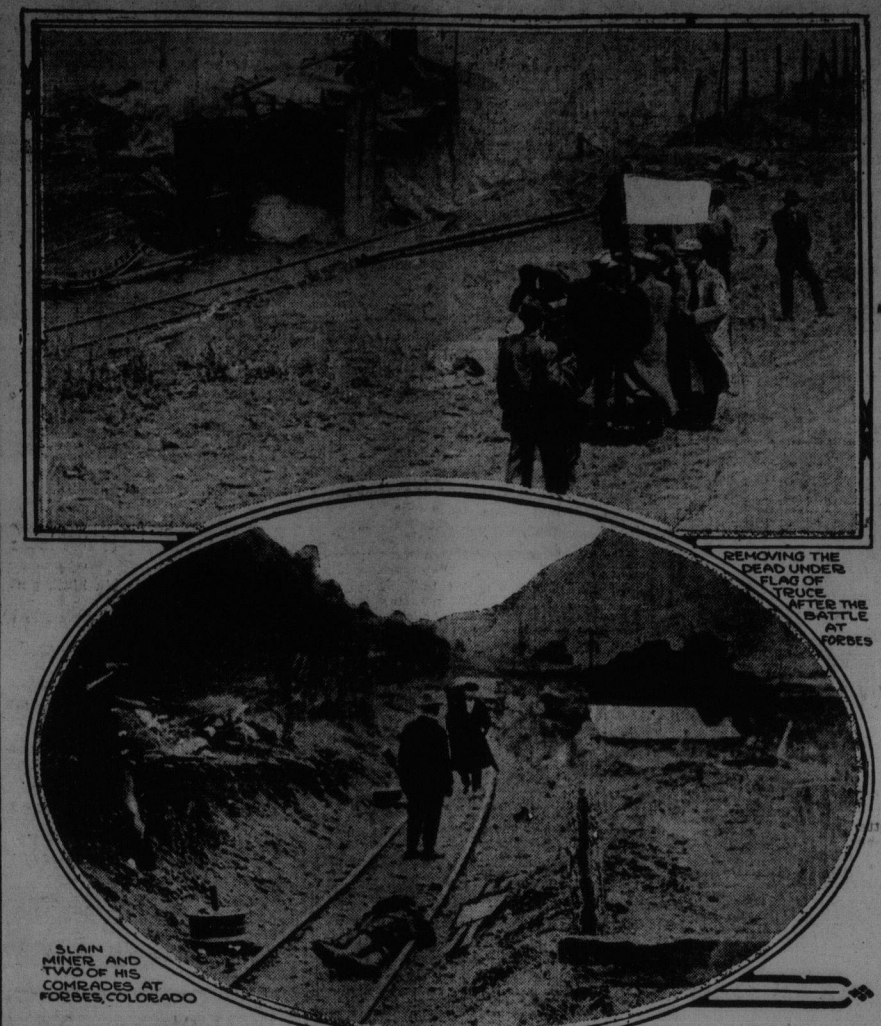
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CAMERA SHOWS THE HORRORS ATTENDING THE COLORADO MINE WAR

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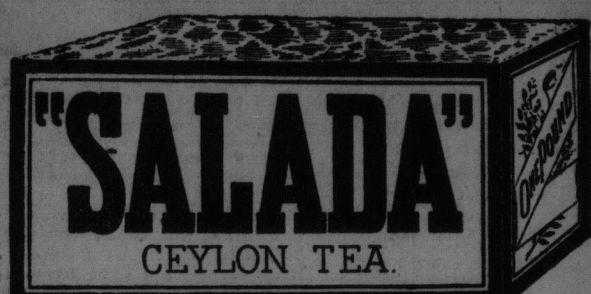
