Stewed Pears

Put large hard pears into a stew-pan with cold water to cover them; boil till they begin to soften; put into cold water for a few minutes, skin cold water for a few minutes, same neatly, halve them and scoop out the core! allow six ounces of sugar to each pound of pear (add what flavoring you like), boil into a syrup with a little wa-ter, add the pears and simmer until they are quite tender.
