FOUR FIERCE BATTLES RAGING IN THE EAST

Von Hindenburg Makes Another Attempt to THE MESSAGE Reach Dvinsk--Mackensen Still Held in Pripet Marshes While Gen. Ivanoff Gains Ground from Austrians in Galicia.

London, Sept. 28.—There has been no cessation of the heavy fighting on the Russian front. From Riga down to Galicia the armies are contesting every inch of the ground, and at least four separate battles are in progress. Field Marshal Von Hindenburg has resumed his efforts to reach Dvinsk, which town has been denied him so many times. The Germans announce that the Russians have been driven from two successive lines of trenches to the southwest of Dvinsk.

Except for Field Marshal Von Mackensen, who is held in the Pripet marshes, all the German generals resumed his saint that she had no aggressive intentions against her neighborhood.
