CANADIAN CAR AND FOUNDRY PROFITS BIG

Statement for Yesterday Shows Surplus of Over 18 Per Cent on Pfd.

SIX MONTHS PROFITS WERE \$1,500,000

Dominion Textile Makes a New High Record, Rising to 87 1/4.

Montreal, April 22.—The statement of the Canadian Car and Foundry for the year ending Sept. 30th last was published today and showed a surplus of over 18 per cent. on the preferred stock for that year. The most encouraging part is the statement of President Currie, that the net profits for the first six months of the fiscal year after payment of fixed charges was approximately \$1,500,000. The preferred stock was stronger, selling at 73 and the common steady at 31. Trading throughout the list was not as active today as during the week. Prices, however, were firm.

There was some activity in Can. Locomotive at 58. Dominion Textile made a new high at 87 1/4 and Maple Leaf was firm at 97 1/2. In the bond department the three war loans were firm, the greatest activity being in the 1931 at 92 1/4.

INDUSTRIALS STRONG IN THE AFTERNOON

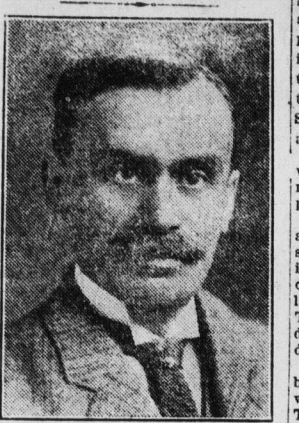
Movement of Prices Chiefly Among Issues of Secondary Importance—Crucible Steel makes New High Price for Present Movement.

New York, April 22.—The industrial list was strong in the early afternoon but the movement of prices was chiefly among issues of secondary importance, including National Enamelling, Central Leather, Central Foundry, C. F. I., United Fruit and Distillers. Crucible made a new high price for this movement, while U. S. Steel remained quiet. Reading sold off fractionally but in the late trading recovered more than its loss.

There was a fair sized reaction in the important issues during the last hour. U. S. Steel selling off a little more than a point from the high. There was no special news to account for this more than a tightening of the call money market. This was the day for the banks to pay for one of the periodic issues of U. S. certificates of indebtedness.

CONTINUANCE OF BULLISH MOVES SEEM LIKELY

Good News from Abroad Would be Inspiration for Further Rise.

POOLS FORMED TO BOOST SPECIALTIES

Large Industries in U. S. Are Getting on a Stronger Basis.

(McDOUGALL & COWANS.)

New York, April 22.—A continuance of bullish operations on a conservative scale seems likely. Speculative interests ought not to ignore profits on bulges on part of holdings, but we link reinstatement on recessions as desirable.

Good news from abroad would be the best inspiration for further betterment but the domestic situation is steadily getting better and in the absence of stocks from France, prices are expected to reflect growing speculative investment confidence. Bullish predictions are found in well posted quarters on the Sugar stocks, Railway Steel Springs, Baldwin, the steel stocks and rubbers.

Large industries are getting on a very strong basis, according to testimony from steel, copper and other representative lines.

Settling down to government work and requirements and better understanding of needs, economies are being effected which will expand net receipts under new fixed prices if the labor condition does not become worse. This latter situation seems to be gradually improving, judging from confidential reports received by us.

Pool channels are reported to be buying Am. Smelter, Baldwin, Railway Steel Springs, U. S. Rubber and Tobacco Products whenever there is a moderate recession in prices. Higher prices are predicted for them in commission houses. A canvass of office sentiment around the street shows that there is division of favoritism among those who keep close to copper interests as regards Inspiration and Anaconda in which, however, the former stock appears to be leading at present.

Both companies are coming to be looked upon as representing the most attractive of American producers, so far as speculative investment is concerned.

Advice is being given in a prominent house to buy Pierce Arrow Motor and Studebaker as a hedge.

A well known financial and investment expert says the purchaser of a standard Junior railroad bond has immense advantage speculatively and from investment viewpoint.

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ALBION MINE WILL SOON BE REOPENED

Fire District is Now About Walled off from the Other Sections — Investigation Shows Conditions Suitable for Working.

New Glasgow, N. S., April 22.—Good progress is being made in the work of reopening the Albion Colliery. Yesterday the mine was re-entered by the Dragger men, following up some exploratory work previously done by them, and the air was found to be satisfactory, so that the "bare-faced" men could get at work. A temporary stopping was erected at Mine Road No. 5 in the third seam. Immediately afterwards the erection of a concrete stoppage was commenced. It is now over half way to the roof and when completed the fire section will be walled off. This work is being done by managers William Athrell and Angus McKay. The Dragger men are also on the ground to deal promptly and effectively if any unexpected trouble should develop with anything of the sort. Present prospects are very favorable and it is expected that in the course of a few days that the mine will have progressed to the point where active steps may be taken to get it underway as a producer again. With the Albion again putting out coal, the Acadia Colliery's output should soon jump upwards to an appreciable extent.

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BISHOP OF LONDON IS FOR CONSCRIPTION

Believes in Clergy Responding to Call and that One Priest be Left for Each Parish.

London, April 21.—The Bishop of London today publicly announced himself a conscriptionist, and said that calling up notifications would be sent to all the clergy in London district under the new act, the principle should be left for each parish.

He appealed to the church to rally to the national cause without regard to the exemption accorded the clergy, and added that he believed other bishops would adopt the same line.
