Lake Placid, N. Y., Feb. 7.—Formation of a northwestern skating circuit to include Minneapolis, Duluth and Winnipeg was announced here today by Julia T. Fitzgerald, of Chicago, president of the International Skating Union. He announced receipt of a message from H. H. Shaw, of Winnipeg, requesting that some of the best known eastern amateur skaters be sent to compete in the events on the new circuit, the dates for which were announced as follows:

Minneapolis, February 15, 16, 18 and 19, no events being held on the 17th; Winnipeg, February 21 and 22; Duluth, February 24 and 25.

Mr. Shaw requested that William Steinmetz, international champion; Roy McWhirter, national champion; Joe Moore, Canadian champion; Charles Jewtraw, former national champion and Richard Donovan, of St. Paul be the men sent to compete. The invitation was given to the skaters, but was rejected. Mr. Fitzgerald said, unless it be made to include all of the large field of amateur skaters here to take silver cup competitions, as well as the five speed kings who will compete for the diamond championship this week.

Charlottetown, P. E. I., Feb. 7.—The Abegweits won their eleventh straight victory in the Eastern section of the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island amateur hockey league tonight, defeating Moncton by six goals to three. It was one of the hardest games of the series. The Abegweits got a good lead in the first period, which ended 4 to 1 in their favor. India's Rioting  
Renewed With More Determined Energy

Many Killed, Including 17 Police Officials by Mob Buildings Stormed.

London, Feb. 7.—(By the Associated Press).—Renewed rioting in several parts of India, involving the killing of at least seventeen police officials and four members of attacking parties in addition to the wounding of a number of persons and some destruction of property, occurred over the week-end, simultaneously with issuance of a declaration by the non-co-operationist leader, Gandhi, that civil disobedience would become effective unless the government granted amnesty.

On Saturday police officers at Chauri, on the Bengal northwestern railway, were stormed by Indian nationalists volunteers. The mob of 2,000 killed the entire staff and a watchman and eight armed policemen who were rushed to the scene to give aid to the staff.

Then the nationalists burned the offices and stripped the bodies of those killed and burned them.

On the same day rioting took place at Bareilly in the middle United provinces. The mob eventually was put to rout after two persons had been killed and five others wounded, among them the district magistrate and the superintendent of police.

Gandhi's declaration was made in a letter to the viceroy. He said he was prepared to advise postponement of civil disobedience until the whole situation was considered anew if the viceroy was ready within seven days.

Special Cemetery For  
Lafayette Aviators

Will Contain a Memorial to the 63 Americans Killed With the Squadron.

Paris, Feb. 7.—The French Government has heartily accepted a plan for forming a special cemetery for the bodies of the aviators of the Lafayette Escadrille who fell for France. It has promised to give a site which has been chosen south of Rheims, opposite the Farnsworth Memorial Cemetery for foreign legionaries killed with Henry Farnsworth of Boston early in the war.

The graves of six aviators have not yet been identified but a search for identification is still continuing. The cemetery will contain a memorial to all Americans killed in France in the aviation series. It will be laid out as a garden, in the American fashion, avoiding any military aspect except for American and French flags at the entrance.


