Ind. Reserves are not in the Railway Belt, but are situated north of the Burrard Inlet, the above road occupies some three acres of the former and $\frac{3}{4}$ of an acre of the latter reserve, the road has already been run through the reserves & graded but not entirely finished -

Dr. Towell states that according to his opinion that the road through these reserves will be advantageous to the Indians as well as the entire community, for the woods on these reserves are nearly impenetrable and the road will afford the Indians great facilities for clearing patches and otherwise using the land near the Road.

Dr. Towell estimates that the land occupied by the road would be worth \$150.00 per acre and that Chief Capilano considered that this price would satisfy his people & particularly desires that the money he paid to the Dept. for the land taken & would be forwarded to the band for purpose of enabling them to improve their game yard & obtain tools and implements to assist in the clearing & cultivation of their reserve.

Dr. Towell did not see the Seymour Creek Indians as they were nearly all away & expresses himself sure that no d.
