

LEPREAUX, 23 miles, nearest station to Mace's Bay. The principal object of interest is the high falls over which the Lepreaux River tumbles into the Harbour. Large quantities of clams are shipped from here every season. Excellent fishing in the river and lakes.

NEW RIVER, 29 miles, about three miles from New River Harbour. A pleasant pic-nic and fishing grounds.

POCOLOGAN, 32 miles, a fishing ground, and a silver ore prospecting ground.

PENNFIELD, 38 miles, nearest point to Beaver Harbour, Crow Harbour, Red Head, and all points on the shore between Deadman's Harbour and New River.

The MINERAL SPRINGS, 41 miles, greatly noted for the peculiar healing qualities of its waters in diseases of the skin.

ST. GEORGE, 47 miles, nearest point to Le Tang Harbour, Bliss's Harbour, Back Bay, LeTete, Lake Utopia and the Red Granite Quarries. Noted for its falls and the fish-way that has been recently constructed around it; for the Red Granite Works and their products, and as being the center of a large fresh water fishing area.

BONNY RIVER, 53 miles, nearest station to Upper Falls, St. George, and to all of the large fishing lakes and streams that are tributary to the Magaguadavic River.

DYER'S, 62 miles, central station for the valley of the Digdeguash. Nearest point to Digedeguash Lake and Clarence Stream, noted fishing grounds.

ST. ANDREWS CROSSING, 68 miles, and 17 miles north of St. Andrews. The N. B. Railway is connected by switches and sidings with the G. S. Railway, so that freight can be handled without breaking bulk.

OAK BAY, 77 miles, principally a farming country. Has a beautiful view down the Bay when the tide is in.

ST. STEPHEN, 82½ miles. The station at present is about half a mile east of the center of the town. The G. S. is here connected with the St. Stephen Branch of the N. B. Railway, so that cars can be transferred without breaking bulk.
