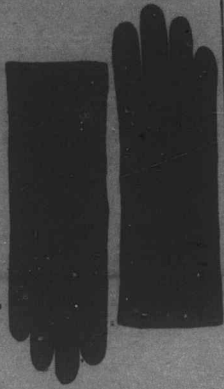

Local and Provincial.

The Whist Club will meet next Monday evening at the home of Mrs T. L. Harvey.

Rev. W. H. Langille, of Lower Horton, preached in the Methodist church here last Sunday.

The Baptist church of New Minas, of which Mr H. G. Colpitts of Acadia is pastor, is to hold anniversary services of an interesting character on Dec. 9th and 10th.

Mr H. H. R. Sch, a member of last year's graduating class at Acadia, has accepted the invitation of the Annapolis Baptist church to become its pastor for a time.

Mr Mark Ruthburn, of Hantsport, was seriously hurt at Canina last week, by a furnace falling down the steps of a collar on him, catching him between his ribs and his hip.

The new engine of the Acadia Electric Light Co. has arrived at the railway station here, and considerable difficulty is being experienced in getting it to the docks. The strongest weight of 40 tons is not sufficient to carry it as it weighs over five tons.

The first meeting of the Twentieth Century Club, recently formed here, of which Dr. Trotter is president, was held last Saturday afternoon in the College library. An interesting paper on "The Love Song of the Bible" was presented by Rev. H. R. Hutch.

Next Sunday, having been appointed "World's Temperance Sunday," all ministers have been asked to preach on the subject of temperance, and all superintendents of Sunday-school to have special exercises whereby the principles underlying the lessons of the day may be strongly impressed.

The service in the Baptist church last Sunday evening was conducted by the College Y. M. C. A. It was a missionary service, the subject being "Worship." Mr Louis Daval presided. Papers were given by Miss Colpitts, Mr H. H. Currie and Mr McFadden. Music was furnished by a special choir.

The new Baptist church at Windsor was formally opened and dedicated last Sunday. The service included a prayer-meeting at 10 o'clock, sermon by Dr. Keirstead at 11 o'clock; in the afternoon a Sabbath-school rally and a sermon by Rev. A. C. Coate, of Halifax; in the evening sermon by Rev. Dr. Trotter. The services were all well-attended and most successful.

When the D. A. R. locomotive Evangelina was being overhauled in the machine shops at K-nville lately, a number of trout were found in the water tank of the boiler. They were quite small, and it is supposed they came from the Fish Pond, the source of the Annapolis water supply through the big service pipe which supplies the engine in the yard here.—Spectator.

Canada has to-day more than one hundred of her sons graduates of the Royal Military College, Kingston, Ont., serving in the imperial army, apart altogether from the Canadian contingent.

John Bogie, seaman on board Schv. Morning Star, Capt. Newcombe, from Kingsport for Moncton, was knocked overboard and drowned on Thursday morning about seven miles below Moncton.

The United States press continues to speak of the wretched condition of the people of the Philippines, notwithstanding the official report that the captured wardrobe of Aguinaldo's wife filled twelve barrels.

The first fall shipment by vessel of potatoes from the Cornwallis district to Havana occurred last week, the schv. Duse, Capt. Edelle, leaving Kingsport on Tuesday. Other vessels will load at Moncton. The manner of shipment is changing somewhat, so each year greater quantities go to Halifax by rail and from that point are carried by steamer.

The Curry Bros. & Bant Co., of Biddeford, which has done considerable contracting and building here, during the past few years, is in financial difficulties. The reason given is the attempt to conduct too large a business on an insufficient capital. The Union Bank has been appointed liquidator. It is probable that some arrangement will be made to compromise with creditors and carry on the business.

The Province and the city are not unwilling to meet all legitimate demands in connection with an Exhibition; but the character of the enterprise must stand investigation. Questionable amusements or "attractions" ought to be dispensed with. The circus business should be sparingly indulged in. Appeal to the intelligence and patriotism of the people, and they will doubtless support the enterprise with the liberality which they have always shown towards education."
