This list includes only the more significant of the speeches referred to in the Memorandum. The explanatory notes do not describe the entire speech but mention only the relevant sections.

1941

July 22. Sumner Welles (U.S. Under Secretary of State).
Norwegian Legation, Washington - principles for a new world order.

July 29. Anthony Eden(British Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs). Foreign Press Association, London - treatment of Germany.

August 24. Winston Churchill (British Prime Minister) broadcast, London. - explanation of Atlantic Charter.

September 24. Ivan Maisky (Soviet Ambassador to Great Britain) Address to Inter-Allied Meeting, St. James's Palace, London - principles of Soviet foreign policy.

November 6. Josef Stalin (Prime Minister) Supreme Soviet, Moscow - Soviet war aims.

1942

February 16. Sumner Welles. Cuban Chamber of Commerce, New York - Attitude of United States to forms of government in Latin American Republics.

February 23, Josef Stalin. Order of the Day, Moscow - Soviet war aims.

May 30. Sumner Welles. Memorial Day, Arlington, Virginia - general statement of United States war aims.

June 2. House of Lords, London - debate on post-war settlement concluded by statement from Lord Cranborne (Secretary of State for Colonies) on collective security.

June 28. Walter Nash (New Zealand Minister to the United States) Camp Tamiment, U.S.A. - plan for World Reconstruction Development Council.

July 23. Anthony Eden. Nottingham - treatment of less highly developed countries.

July 23. Cordell Hull (United States Secretary of State) broadcast, Washington - United States war aims in general.

August 5. House of Lords - debate on post-war international reconstruction, with Government statement by Lord Simon (Lord Chancellor) on an international court.
