an imposing appearance, both for the painter and the culinary artist. The lobster has his rocky hole at a depth from six to twelve fathoms, and the propagation of his race is continued on in marvelous numbers. More than 12,000 eggs have been counter in a single female! When he reaches the light he is inactive, but in his own realm he dashes with rapid speed over chasms and rocky tablelands of the ocean. A motion of his tail is sufficient to hurl him down more than fifty feet deep, and thus escape the swiftest pursuer. So sure is this leap, that he never misses the entrance of his cavern, even in the most precipi-

enough to admit his body. During the proper season, five or six ships sail between the Thames alone and the coast of Norway to supply London with lobsters, and others bring to Holland more than half a million. It is estimated that in Northern Europe alone nearly five million lobsters are consumed every year. I have met with no data to estimate their consumption in our own land, where they form so favorite a dish.
