Leafs Take Road in Second Place

Have Won Nine Straight and Ten Out of Twelve at Home

Toronto, May 29.—From second to the bottom to second to the top is some jump, but the Leafs did it in their series at home, which ended last night, and the spirit that has carried the local boys upward within the last week and a half was characterized in their double header with Newark yesterday, when they took both ends of the attraction by one-run margins, the first by a 3 to 2 score, and the second by 2 to 1. Not quite three games separates Toronto and Binghamton.

It was a bargain day attraction for the ladies, and trust the fair-sec to pick a good day. They turned out in good numbers, and they were provided with more excitement in those two contests yesterday than has been seen in all the games played at home since the possible exception of Monday's game with Newark. The issue was always in doubt, and the ninth inning in both sessions kept the players and fans on their toes.

Both games were hard ones to lose for the invaders, but especially so the first, while they proved very acceptable victories for the Leafs, and were just rewards for their never-say-die qualities and their fighting powers. In the first session young Alchele poised on the rubber against Woodward, but the latter had much the better of the argument for a greater part of the struggle, and then suddenly Alchele pitched fair ball and was given good support. The Bears grabbed a run in the first inning, and then added another in the first half of the fifth, but in their half of the same inning the Leafs got one of the runs back.
