MARCONI IN MONTREAL.

Wireless Telegraphy Will Soon be in Ottawa to Confer with the Government About the Future.

Montreal, Que., Dec. 30.—Signor Marconi arrived from Cape Breton last night. He was accompanied by an attendant, and by Mr. Smith, secretary of the Canadian Postoffice Department. Marconi will remain in Montreal to-day, when he will be the guest at a luncheon tendered him by the Elder-Dempster Company. Mr. Marconi said last night that he had come to Canada to interest Canadian capitalists, as he had all the financial backing he required. He will leave for Ottawa this evening to confer with the Canadian Government.

Millions in His Grasp.

Halifax, Dec. 30.—Marconi has received an offer of \$1,000 a lecture for 12 lectures to be delivered by him in the United States. He declined. Marconi's hopes and ambitions soar beyond lecturing at \$1,000 a night. He is neglecting the immediate development of short distance wireless telegraphy, in which, he says, money can be made at once, in order to demonstrate the possibilities of trans-Atlantic work, and he says that he has no inclination to stand on the lecture platform while such a great matter engages his attention.

THROUGH THE ICE.

One Child Drowned at Merrittton—Six Others Have Narrow Escape.

St. Catharines, Dec. 30.—About 6 o'clock Saturday night seven small children, ranging in ages from 8 to 15, while skating on a pond near the Grand Trunk freight shed, in Merrittton, broke through the ice, and all had narrow escapes from drowning. Six of them were rescued, but one little girl, named Flossie McDonald, is still under the ice. Wilbur Darling heard the screams of the unfortunate children. He grabbed a pole and jumped into the icy water. Six of the little ones clung to one another. One succeeded in getting hold of the pole Mr. Darling held, and had strength enough to hold on and bring his comrades with him out of the water. The other little girl, by this time, had sunk from view and was drowned. Dr. Vandenberg and others, after six hours' hard work, restored to life the six children. Five of them, it was feared, could not be brought to, but after some minutes showed signs of life, and at 7 o'clock were said to be out of danger. The names of the children rescued were: Four Ramsay, one McDonald and one Leamy. Flossie McDonald was 9 years old, and the daughter of a prominent family of Merrittton.
