### THE VILLAGE COUNCIL

A meeting of the village council was held on Thursday evening. All the members present, the reeve in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

On motion, an order was passed to pay the assessor his salary of \$40 and the sum of \$10 each to the five commissioners engaged to advise in respect to the revision of the roll.

G. W. Brown, sanitary inspector, presented a bill of about \$18 for extra services in connection with enforcing the quarantine regulations of the local board of health. Payment of this account was questioned and finally deferred, pending a more full enquiry, the council being of opinion that the service rendered came fully within the scope of the sanitary inspector's duties as defined in the by-law appointing him.

At this meeting the reeve, with the full concurrence of the members of the council, very gently but clearly made it known to the Chief of Police, Fire and Sanitary Inspector, etc., that his further incumbency of these offices would be contrary to the wishes of the council and to the expressed opinion of a large number of the ratepayers. The Chief positively declined to accept the hint contained in the reeve's very courteous address, or to comply with the formal request for his resignation that followed a little later. He said that if discharged now he would endeavor to collect pay for the full year.

### OFFICIAL TESTS

Several members of the fine herd of Holsteins of G. A. Gilroy, Glen Buell, have recently qualified for the Record of Merit in the tests conducted by the Holstein-Friesian Association. Mr. G. W. Clemons, the secretary, gives the results as follows:—

Fourteen Days—milk 1020.62 lbs.; butter fat 88.26 lbs., equivalent to 87.64 lbs. butter.

Fourteen Days—milk 1194.5 lbs.; butter fat 39.24 lbs., equal to 45.79 lbs. butter.

Seven Days—Carmen Sylvia 4th (3289) at 6 y. 0 m. 13 d.; milk 451.25 lbs.; butter fat 16.69 lbs., equal to 19.47 lbs. butter.

### Death From Poisoning

She had been in poor health for about two years, and lately it was evident that her mind had weakened under the strain. Securing the absence of her attendant for a short time, she obtained possession of some Paris green and mixing it with water drank it.
