THE HUNT GOES ON

Roberts is Actively Engaged in Chasing Boers.

Large Captures of Cattle and Sheep—An Unknown Number of the Enemy Killed.

London, Oct. 5.—Lord Roberts has wired as follows to the war office: "Hart returned to Krugersdorp Oct. 1. He has been 33 days from his base, marched 210 miles, was in contact with the enemy 29 days, killed an unknown number and captured 96. The British lost three killed, three prisoners and 24 wounded. Hart brought back 2,720 head of cattle and 2,281 sheep."

ANOTHER PROCLAMATION.

Lord Roberts Issues One—Burn-ing Down Boer Homes.

London, Oct. 5.—Advices from Pretoria this afternoon say Lord Roberts has issued a proclamation declaring that all matters concerning the provincial government of Vaal River Colony must be referred to Gen. Maxwell to appoint such officers as are necessary for enforcing the law in various districts, and authorizes him to make such changes in the laws as will make them conform to present conditions. Lord Roberts has also caused to be gazetted a notice providing for uniformity in the treatment of the inhabitants of Vaal and Orange River Colonies. Burglars who are voluntarily brought in will not be transported, but this order shall not apply to prominent military and political personages, nor to those who violate the laws of submission, war to foreigners, should any leader enquire the terms of surrender, they must be referred to headquarters.

A Cape Town special says that it is reported that Lord Roberts' troops are burning the homesteads of the Boers who are still in the field. The homes destroyed belong mostly to the men in De Wet's command.

DREAM LEADS TO DEATH.

Man in a Car Jumps to Rescue Injured.

Sioux City, Iowa, Oct. 5.—Edward R. Akman, of Manning, Iowa, was stealing a ride on a Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul train en route to Sioux City and he fell asleep in the box car, dreamed he was in a railroad wreck and heard the moans and cries for help of the persons injured. He went to their assistance and climbed through the end door, falling under the wheels. Both of his legs were cut off. A brakeman saw the man fall and the train was stopped. Akman was brought to Sioux City and died three hours later at St. Joseph's Hospital. He told his dream to the trainmen after they had picked him up. He was trying to get to his home of a relative near Sioux City and was not accustomed to leaving his home.

PROVED FALSE.

The Allegation That Chinamen Cannot be Converted Untrue.

To the Planet—I am sorry to see going the rounds of the press, an extract from one of the American reviews, pointing Bigelow, which is a reproach to the truth, to the mission work of the churches, and to John Chinaman. Bigelow says, narrating an interview with a Russian Greek priest (or Archimandrite) in Peking, whom he asked how many converts he had made; his answer was "that he thought he had made one, but he did not wish to be taken for saying this positively." "I have been here 40 years, and perhaps I have converted one Chinaman. When missionaries tell you that they have done more, than that, do not believe them. This is endorsed by Mr. Bigelow. Now the facts of the case are that all over that vast empire are found to-day, hundreds, yes, thousands of Chinamen who are suffering martyrdom for their faith in Christ Jesus, and are sustained by the Holy Spirit in the most horrible tortures inflicted by their enemies, such as being stripped, flogged, hung up by the thumbs, then hacked and gashed, and finally disemboweled before being beheaded. Jesus Christ by the grace of God, tasted death for every man. Chinamen who learn this and receive His grace are just as good a sample of what God can do as other men, and the present terrible persecution proves it."

FRIGHTENED TO DEATH.

Watertown, N. Y., Oct. 5.—Miss Minnie Garvin, an invalid, was frightened to death at Sterlingville yesterday. She occupied a chair in a baggage car, and when the train stopped the conductor and trainman started to lift her in the chair from the car. The chair tipped forward, and Miss Garvin fell to the ground. She died in an hour. Death, the physicians say, was due to paralysis of the heart, caused by fright.

WANTS COMPETENT USHERS.

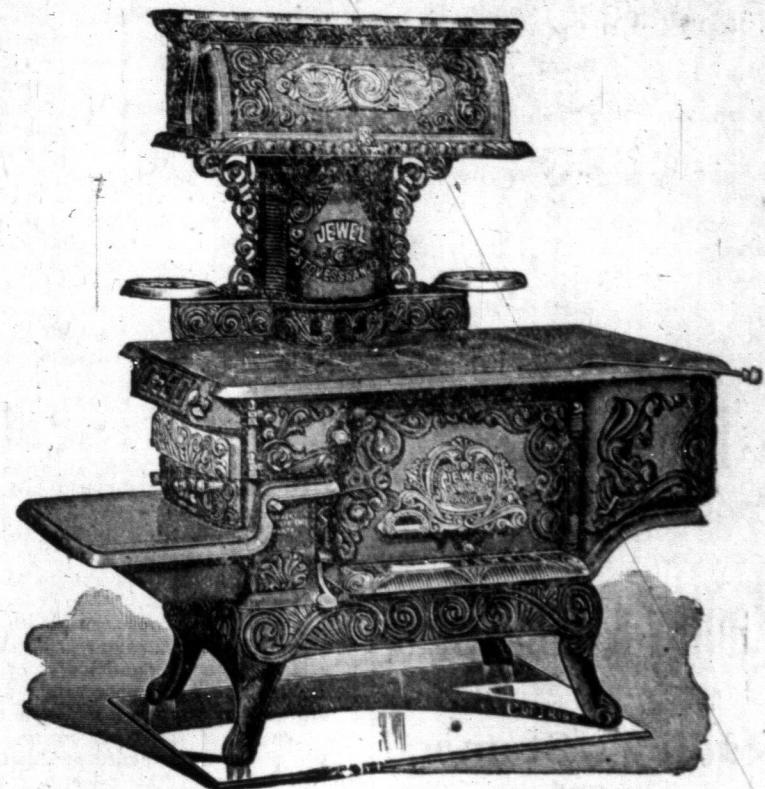
