Sir Joseph Ward, the acting Colonial Treasurer, made his financial statement, recently. Last year's revenue amounted to

£6,152,839, while the expenditure amounted to £5,914,915, leaving an excess of revenue over expenditure of 4237,924. Adding to this the balance which was brought over from the preceding year, namely, 532,564 after deduction of the sum of £500,-000, which was transferred to the public works fund, a surplus is left of £270,488. At the close of the past year, the public works expenditure amounted to £2,143,252, and £200,000 of advances previously received were paid off. The cash balance was £454,059, with about £100,000 of the last loan to be re-

The public debt was now £52,-66,447, showing an increase of £3,-375,212 during the year, of which amount however, quite £1,619,285, being at once interest-earning will not become a burden on the tax-pay-

The bringing into operation of the principles of local self-government by the Maoris, under the Maori Councils act of 1901, has already proved to be a great boon to them, and it ensures the increase of the race. Oldage pensions cost the colony last year £207,000. The land tax and income tax revenue exceeded the estimates. Works are in progress at the State coal mines at Westport and Greymouth. The reductions given by the present Government since it took office are: Railways, £510,000; mortgage tax, 7 £25,000; posts and telegraphs, £181,000; customs, £138,000.

Every effort is being made to ure trade with South Africa, the service to South Africa. The construction of railways and of roads is being vigorously pushed forward. The Government proposes further large concessions to the public-in railways, £40,000, and a reduction of £25,000 from the mortgage tax and also proposes to assist the bush settlers by a remission of rent during the first few years of their

The new loan will also be used for providing additional rolling stock, and for relaying the permanent way, for developing the gold fields and for telegraphic extension purposes. LAYING THE PACIFIC CABLE. Description of the Colonia That

The new cable ship Colonia, which is to be used to lay the British Pacific cable, is practically ready for her journey. She is 500 feet in ength, with beam of 56 feet, and is designed to carry close upon 10,000 tons dead weight. When loaded she is to steam 11½ knots. The length of cable that she can carry is about 4.000 miles, which ia a greater length than could be put on board the Great Eastern when she was ingaged in her cable-lying expeditions. The builders have designed an elegantly-looking craft in spite of the special conditions which had to be fulfilled, and in this respect the Colonia is in this respect the Colonia is a pleasing contrast to cable ships afloat. The spar deck of the ship is of teak, and is flush right fore and aft, making a spacious promenade.

Amidships is accommodation for the officers and numerous eectrical experts. There are also bathrooms. large gallery, butchery, bakery and on the deck below a refrigerator chamber. Adjoining the cabins is a spacious dining saloon, paneled in oak and beautifully fitted, even to the minutest detail. On the bridge deck above are apartments of the captain, being a suite of three rooms Next to these is a chart-room of ample proportions, and above it is the navigating bridge and boat deck. In the after part of the vessel on the spar deck are two houses of special interest to electricians, one of them being the test room, and the other the drum room. These have a very complete installation of galvanometers and other testing instru-ments, together with a quantity of the special appliances by means of which all the calculations are made as to the amounts of cable paid out, couched in terms similar to the note the strain on it; and its electrical resistance. On the main deck is accommodation for the crew, the cabin hands, and the stewards, and there is also a well-aired hospital. Amidships will be found an engineer's repairing shop, with a lathe, drills and several other machines. Below the main deck are the four huge table tanks. two of them being forward of the bridge and two aft. The Rontgen rays were applied in thirty-six cases, some them cases which were regarded as hopeless, and several of them in which surgical operation was impossible. In all the cases such improve-ment was effected; in some of the cases the effect was miraculous. Dr. Pusey thinks that the light treatment should be at least given a trial in all inoperable cases; it is, at any rate, painless. Another contribution to the same subject which appears in the same paper is that which attributes the malignancy of sores" to some unknown constituent of the sun's rays.
