Strikers Attack Workers.

Montreal, Aug. 3.—A lively fracas occurred at the Grosvener Flats, now building on Sherbrooke street, yesterbuilding on Sherbrooke street, yesterday morning in connection with the carpenters' styke. A large number of strikers assembled around the building and attacked the non-union men going to work. A lively fight ensued, but was soon ended. The police had been expecting trouble, and a strong detachment was on hand, which immediately charged the strikers with drawn batons. A number of broken heads and hats resulted, but after a lively struggle all strikers except two avoided argle all strikers except two avoided arrest. Further trouble is expected, especially as the bricklayers refuse to work if the building is kept under police guard.

Britain's Big Bills

London, Aug. 3.—According to a Par liamentary return issued, Great Britain liamentáry refurn issued, Great Britain grants \$540,000 in annuities to the Royal family and pensions for judicial services to the amount of \$245,000, the total of which is \$75,000 more than the pensions paid for naval, military, political and civil services together. The sum of \$305,000 is spent on the maintenance of Royal palaces, \$510,000 on Royal parks and \$145,000 on the secret Royalmeer Asylum for crimsovial parks and \$140,000 on the secret service. Broadmagor Asylum, for crim-inal lunatics, cost \$170,000 yearly; the Irish Constabulary \$5,520,000; the Brit-ish Museum \$845,000, and the National Gallery \$82,500.

Unasked Increase of Pay.

London, Aug. 3.—Fifty employes of the Grand Trunk car shops have been informed that they may expect an increase in wages when their July pay is due. To many of the men the increase comes unasked and is unexpected. It is understood the increase was housely about through the good offices brought about through the good offices of the superintendent, Thomas Treleaven. Just now the shops are being worked to full capacity with plenty of work in prospect.
