Town Council Meeting.

A special meeting of the town council was held on Tuesday evening. The Mayor and Couns. Borden, Starr, Collins and Porter, with the Recorder, were present.

Resolved, That the provisions of sec. 24 of chapter 1 of the Act of 1895 shall be made operative in this town.

The resolution was not adopted, the council feeling that it was advisable to take no such action at present, but to give the matter a year's investigation before doing so.

The committee appointed to enquire into the advisability of procuring additional land for school purposes reported recommending the purchase of the lot east of the school building from Mr. G. V. Reed, for \$1600. The report was adopted and the School Board, with the Recorder, were appointed to complete the purchase.

Supreme Court.

The Supreme Court met at Kentville on Tuesday of last week, Judge Wetherbee presiding. There were no civil suits for trial. Evidence was laid before the Grand Jury against William H. Town, and Alfred Whiting for resisting and assaulting officers in charge of their duty, and an indictment was found. This was the assault case of December last when Constable Selfridge, of Somerset, and Policeman Toye, of Wolfville, attempted to take Townsend at Kentville. Townsend had previously escaped after being arrested under a warrant issued to satisfy a conviction for a breach of the Canada Temperance Act. No preliminary examination was held before the Grand Jury. Mr. H. H. Wickwire acted as Crown Prosecutor. Mr. Roscoe for the defence took exception to the form of the indictment. The only witnesses called for the defence were the prisoners. In summing up the case his Lordship charged somewhat strongly against the prisoners but stated that being very doubtful of the legality of the indictment he would see that if found guilty they would not be punished until the objections taken had been considered by the full bench.

Bring in Your Milk.

The coming season promises to be a prosperous one for the Acadia Dairy Company. Their factory, which commenced operations about a year ago, has, under the efficient management of Mr. Logan, given very satisfactory returns to the stockholders, and its product has received the highest praise from consumers. To the reluctance which people have to enter into a new, and seemingly doubtful enterprise, the cheese factory has proved no exception, but the results obtained last season while the industry was yet in its infancy, have convinced the majority of farmers that the co-operative plan is by far the most profitable and altogether satisfactory means of disposing of their milk. By the old-fashioned and laborious process of churning a considerable percentage of butter fat is lost, while by the improved methods adopted in the factory every ounce is utilized. The farmers are this year entering more readily into the enterprise, and the amount of milk brought in is constantly increasing. To those who are producers and have not yet sent in their milk to the factory, we would urge the merits of this plan, and we can assure them results that it would be impossible to attain by the old-fashioned methods.

The unveiling of the magnificent monument to Sir John Macdonald's memory in Montreal last Thursday, marks an epoch in the national affairs of Canada apart from the mere sentiment of reverence for the deceased statesman's greatness. It is an upspringing of the gift of appreciation of the good deeds of great men. There are other men dead in Canada who were great in their day, and their memories still linger in the fond recesses of the public heart; there are men alive to-day whose deeds will mark them for public recognition. Monuments, memorials, tablets, engravings, syntheses of praise, all these things should be added to the memories of our great good men.

The mounted police census shows that between 1891 and 1894 the population of the Northwest Territories increased from 52,250 to 73,505, or by over 40 per cent. For a period of not very good immigration that is a record not to be equaled. It is kept up till the end of the decade, with the increase Macdonald has shown, Winnipeg will begin to have a respectable bank country to look out on.

An Interesting Letter.

The following letter written by a gentleman in England to a prominent member of the Kings County Agricultural Society, has been handed in for publication. It will be found interesting: DEAR SIR,—A few days ago, I had the pleasure of receiving by post a copy of the "Annual Report of the Secretary for Agriculture, Nova Scotia, for 1894." Accept my best thanks for the same. I have perused it with great interest and find as usual that your Society gives a splendid report of its year's working. If the other societies spoke out as freely it would be a mutual help and no topic of importance by that means would be likely to be overlooked.

I tried to get some Gravenstein apples in this town about Christmas but could not meet with any. Nor have I throughout the winter seen any apples ticketed "Nova Scotia." On Saturday last, however, I saw a fine display of apples in a shop window with an artistic ticket "Fine Australian Apples," and they sold freely at 6 pence a pound. In the same shop a cask had just been opened of Tasmanian apples—very beautiful, very attractive in appearance at the same price, 6 pence per pound. On reaching home my wife said: "You should just see some Tasmanian apples at—shop; they are crapped up in tissue paper singly, they looked just like peaches, price 8 pence per pound. I was told that these apples are retailed in London at 8 pence per pound. You and your friends may ask how it is that there should be such a difference in the price. I could do so satisfactorily. Your fruit growers I certainly think would do well to put a grand display card in each barrel; the cost of such a card will not exceed one cent each. On the front of the card might be shown a typical apple or group of apples; conspicuously along the top should be the words, Nova Scotian Apples, then underneath, the name of the variety. By that means the variety and the locality in which it was grown gets to be thoroughly known in thousands of households who will in future years insist upon their fruiterers supplying them again with the same kind of apples. Then on the back of the card I would recommend that each grower should have his name and address. This would act beneficially as few, I suppose, would care to give their names if the barrels were not packed properly.

Before Christmas I was buying some apples when the shopkeeper said: "Look here what has been enclosed in this barrel." It was a handwritten letter, stating the date when the apples were packed, and asking whoever bought them if they would state the date the barrel was opened, in what condition the fruit was found, whether they were sound and good, or good for nothing; asking in fact, for a straightforward report, good or ill. No name was given to indicate the variety; it was shipped from New Hampshire. In appearance and flavor it resembled the English Blenheim Orange, but was smaller in size. I mention this to show that that N. H. apple grower was on the right track to get direct orders for his produce.

I see that Crosse's and Cheese Factories are becoming quite an institution in your Province. Many farmers may be wondering why that industry has become so long, in fact why they themselves could not have seen what immense wealth lay so easily within their reach. Now that they have grasped the idea, I hope they will produce butter and cheese of such excellent quality that it will always command the highest price in the market. As a matter of modified opinion, I may tell you that the finest, best flavored butter I have tasted for years came from Australia. This sample in color and appearance was like the butter that took first prize at the Royal Agricultural Show held a year or two ago at Warwick.

On page 40, "The Gas Treatment." Whoever will make a specialty of this kind of business will fill his pockets with dollars, and at the same time become a benefactor to orchardists. For different insect pests different compounds may be required, but when one is determined to be master of so important an art as the extermination of the insect pests of the orchard he will study chemistry and entomology with that sole object.

The idea throughout Canada appears to be to export, export—well, it can hardly be otherwise under present circumstances, but considering the vast mineral resources why not get more energy concentrated upon the development of these resources. For instance, you require 600,000 tons of iron yearly and you produce one tenth of the amount yourselves. There seems to be no reason why Nova Scotia should not produce one-half or say 300,000 tons of that iron. The quality of your iron is fit for anything. Then it is invariably found that wherever the iron is produced manufacturers spring up by scores to make it into thousands of useful articles to be put on the market at lowest cost. While export is good, a market in your own colony, or even at your own door, is very much better. Increase the population of your Province by miners, iron-workers and artisans, and the farmers of that lovely country will be the most happy and prosperous tillers of the soil under the sun.

I hope you have been in customary good health since I last wrote you; that you may be spared to hold the honored position of Sec'y for Kings County for a long while to come. Whenever you can write I shall be glad to hear from you. This letter you can show to your friends and to Professor Lawson if you think proper to do so. These dates show that the present season is earlier by several days than any year since '89. The comparison is a fair one because it is made from the same trees in the several years mentioned.

This year I had potatoes in blossom on the 11th June, earlier by ten days than in the previous five years.
