PUT THE WOODBOX ON CASTORS Putting the woodbox on castors is a simple change in kitchen arrangement, but it makes it easier to keep the kitchen clean and to manage the fire in the range. The woodbox can be easily rolled close to the range when the fire needs replen-ishing, then pushed out of the way when cooking is ove. When it can be rolled about rubbish and dirt will not gather behind and under it as it will with a stationary box which is too heavy to move. A rack may be added at the back on which to hang papers. They are then ready to start the fire, clean the stove, or put down when a messy job is in pro-gress, such as picking a chicken, clean-ing fish or polishing silver.


