

## NATIONALISTS WILL TAKE NO PART IN SOUTHERN IRELAND ELECTIONS.

### Polish Government is Attempting To Settle The Korfanty Insurrection.

### Miners Strike Continues But Reconsideration Of National Pool Possible.

**COMMUNITY OF INTEREST.**  
London, May 8.—Eamon De Valera, Irish Republican leader, writing in the Irish Independent of Dublin today, says "we shall never cease to maintain there is a community of interest between our countrymen of the Northeastern corner of Ireland and our people of the south and west."

**KENTUCKY RACES.**  
Louisville, Ky. May 8.—"Behave Yourself," Kentucky bred three year old, won the Kentucky derby this afternoon, winning for her owner, E. R. Bradley, of Lexington. \$38,000. Blacksvant, second, won another \$10,000 for Bradley. Sixty thousand people says "Behave Yourself" in and beat his stablemate by a neck at Churchill Downs.

**CRAIG ASKS DIRECT DEALING.**  
Belfast, May 8.—Sir James Craig, premier Designate of Ulster, whose recent conference with Eamon De Valera is still the subject of much comment, said, in speaking at Lisburne yesterday, that he made it plain to the south and west of Ireland that it was not with amateur peace makers and meddlers in Irish affairs they had to deal but with the leaders of the people of Ulster, if there were to be peace negotiations.

**NATIONALIST TO TAKE NO PART**  
Dublin, May 8.—John Dillon, chairman of the Nationalist Party, will publish a letter to-morrow saying he has advised his friends to take no part in the Southern Elections in view of possible difficulties between Sinn Fein and Nationalist.

**SUNDAY IN IRELAND.**  
Dublin, May 8.—Week end disturbances in Ireland included the killing of two constables and the wounding of two sergeants besides a stampede of the Jesuit congregation in Dublin in which several persons were wounded. The stampede was caused by firing outside the Church. Dublin Castle reported unsuccessful attacks on barracks at Dublin and Gomburn.

### POLISH GOVERNMENT DEPLORES INSURRECTION.

Warsaw, May 8.—In face of increasing clashes between insurgents and Germans the Polish Government has decided upon a vigorous plan of action in an attempt to settle the insurrection, initiated by Adelbert Korfanty, former Pelebscicte Commissioner in the Upper Silesia province, with the object of joining the industrial section of Upper Silesia to Poland. The Polish Cabinet has issued a statement to the effect that while the ministry thoroughly understood patriotic motive which led to the outbreak the Government again disapproved of

the insurrection and considered it a vain move. One of the problems the Government is compelled to face is related to efforts of the Poles to go to the assistance of the insurgents. Despatches received to-day report that twenty thousand armed workmen have attempted to cross the frontier from East Silesia. Pitched encounters between insurgents and Germans have occurred in the Rybnik area where, according to reports, more than one hundred and fifty Poles and even more Germans were killed. In a protracted fight for the possession of the important foundry centre more than thirty Poles were killed. Despite the efforts of the Government to soothe public opinion repeated labor demonstrations have taken place in Warsaw. Several have occurred before the British and Italian Legations the workmen showing resentment.

### RIORDAN IN DIFFICULTIES.

Montreal, May 8.—In a letter from the Committee of the Directorate of the Riordan Company, sent to shareholders on Saturday, the principal item is the statement, "This Committee reports the financial position of your Company is serious and unless further working capital can be secured immediately your Company will be unable to continue business." The balance sheet of Riordan for end of March shows a deficit of working capacity of over three million. It is proposed to issue five million ten year eight per cent mortgage and collateral trust bonds.

### THE COAL SITUATION.

London, May 8.—Efforts will be made this week by outside influence to secure a renewal of negotiations for the settlement of the miners strike, it was indicated here today, but hope among interested parties seems remote, until after the Whitsuntide holidays. There is talk among the Executive of the Miners Federation of returning to London before the end of the week to compare notes of information they have picked up on visits to the mining districts, and to consider the suggestion that they abandon their demand for a national pool which has been the stumbling block in the negotiations in favor of some scheme that will answer the same purpose. Meanwhile the position of the country's industries and public utilities is going from bad to worse. Railways, street car and underground transportation systems have announced drastic reduction of services. Even newspapers are affected, some of the larger London dailies going to press at ten o'clock at night to conserve coal and light and enable employees to leave for home before transportation stops for the night.

## Public Utilities In Carbonear.

Dear Sir,—Now that our legislators are in session, and monopolies and long term agreements are being discussed, it might be timely to remind them to consider well before they give away the people's heritage for the proverbial mess of pottage. This has been strikingly brought home to the people of this and neighboring towns during the past few weeks.

The United Towns Electrical Company about 20 years ago were given the monopoly for 50 years to light this and the adjacent towns. It was given to the people of Hr. Grace, Heart's Content and Carbonear as a public utility, and they were given the waters that run over the Blue Hills for the purpose of running their dynamos. The towns, in the score of years that has operated have enjoyed a reasonable rate for lighting, but in recent years Mr. J. J. Murphy has gained control of this company and it now appears he intends to "demand his pound of flesh." Some time ago the subscribers for his telephones received a 24 hours notice that he intended to raise the price of telephones nearly 100 percent and the subscribers very promptly told the company to take them out. Now he gives notice to the similar and poorer subscribers for light that he purposes to raise their lighting from 60 to 100 per cent. This, as you can imagine, has caused a very strong feeling of resentment against this company and against all monopoly and those who obtain exclusive rights for a long term. To make matters worse the United Towns' have not increased their price in places that the Public Service Electric Co. operates, which goes to show that they are discriminating, and the public want to know the reason. We are not favored in this country with a Public Utility Board to right our wrongs and unless our representatives take this matter up, we have to resort to our only means—which is to go without electric light. This does not seem fair to the public who are desirous of getting a fair deal.

We know our water power has been given away, we know the government has been subsidizing that company with our moneys for street lighting. We know that all material required by an electric company has decreased in price considerably and why in the name of all that is just and right should this company try to extract the utmost farthing out of the public at this unfortunate time when the people do not know where to turn to provide for themselves and families. The Company has cut off the light from several houses in different parts of this town, as a lesson to others we presume, who contemplate not paying the increased light rate. Feelings are running high over what is considered a grave injustice, and the question arises as to what the powers that be can do in the matter.

The same people that control the United Towns' were given 30 years exclusive rights of the telephone over the Peninsula of Avalon last session. We wonder do they want any more exclusive rights during the present session? This is not written with a tinge of political feeling Mr. Editor, but we trust it will awaken the public and their representatives and show "there is something rotten in the state of Denmark."

### TWO NOTABLE UTTERANCES.

The first really hopeful indication of a possible entente between North and South Ireland is reported in our cable messages to-day. There is not much in what is said, but much may, we think, be read between the lines. Professor de Valera asserts that there is a community of interest between Ulster and the rest of Ireland, and that community will be maintained. Sir James Craig, on the other hand, cries "hands off" to amateur peace-makers, and intimates in unmistakable terms that peace in Ireland must come through negotiations between Irishmen themselves. Possibly we are too sanguine in discerning afar off a silver lining to the dense clouds that have so long frowned on Dark Rosaleen, but even a glimmer of light in the prevailing darkness inspires hope. The two utterances may mean little, but they are notable, inasmuch as they breathe of a United Ireland.
