 First Two Will Take Place at Philadelphia on October 9 and 10

Philadelphia, Sept. 30.—The national baseball commission session, at Bellevue-Stratford hotel at noon today, announced the dates of the world's series games.
 The first two games will be played at Philadelphia on Oct. 9 and 10; third and fourth games played at Boston on Oct. 12 and 13; fifth game at Philadelphia on Oct. 16, and sixth at Boston on Oct. 15.
 In event of the tie for the National commission decides where the seventh is to be played. Umpires are Klem, Byron, National, and Dineen Hilderbrand, American. President Gaffney, of the Braves called toss of the coin to decide where the first games be played, and lost.

HOPPE LEADS INMAN
 New York, Sept. 30.—After playing two 500 point games at balk line today, Willie Hoppe the world's balk line champion, led Melbourne Inman, the English billiard champion of the world by a total score of 1,304 to 897 points in the international billiard contest here.
 Inman had a lead of 602 to 304 points when play began today, gaining this lead last night on the English table. Hoppe soon changed the aspect of affairs when he struck his gait at his favorite style in the first game at this afternoon. He accumulated the necessary 500 points in 17 innings while Inman was gathering 107.
 In the second game Hoppe was not in such good form, while Inman showed decided improvement, as he made 188 in 24 innings, while Hoppe required 25 turns at the table before he secured his quota of 500.
 So far Hoppe's chances look the better for ultimate success, as on the results of the three games played Hoppe outclassed Inman 3 to 1 at balk line while the English player is only twice as clever as the American on the English table.

Chicken Shooting Opens Tomorrow
 Sportsmen All in Readiness and Reports Show Birds Are Plentiful

Numbers of sportsmen are leaving this city late this afternoon or evening to be ready early tomorrow morning for their first shots at prairie chickens. Those who go out this evening are men who have camps or hunting lodges while hunters who are less fortunate will get up in the early hours of the morning and by walking or driving, get to some spot on the prairies where chickens have been seen.
 A great many have already been located as the birds are as numerous this year, as they have been for a great number of seasons. This weather will assist in making good bags as the chickens usually lay pretty close on hot days but if it is cool with heavy winds, they become wild and take to heavy cover so that they are difficult for the dog as well as the hunter.
 It is claimed that a great many licenses have been issued by the Government and in all parts of Manitoba there will be more shooters on the prairies than ever before.
 The season opens Oct. 1 and closes Oct. 20. The limit of the bag for each is 20 for a single day and one hundred for a season.

Further Peace Proposals Soon
 (Special to The News)
 Berlin.—The International News learns from a reliable source that Germany will make no further efforts to induce Italy to alter her position of neutrality. Rumors are current again that further peace proposals will be made to the warring powers in a short time.
Montenegrins Capture Forts
 (Special to The News)
 Cetinje.—Montenegrin troops captured the fortifications erected by the Austrians about Gorazda, and are pursuing the Austrians. (Official.)
Kaiser's Stock Captured
 (Special to The News)
 Petrograd.—Among the war trophies which reached Smolensk are the blooded cattle and horses of Emperor William, from his country estate at Rominten, which were seized by the Russian troops. They will be distributed among the Russian stock raisers.
Austrians Reinforce Germans
 (Special to The News)
 Antwerp.—The bombardment of forts Wretham Wavre and St. Catherine continues.
 German troops operating between Lisle and Breendock were driven back in disorder.
 Austrian soldiers are reinforcing the Germans. Heavy Austrian artillery is being rushed to the German front. (Official.)
 Antwerp.—King Albert issued orders that Antwerp must be held at any cost.

WILL LIKELY PROVE CORRECT
 (By C. F. Bertelli)
 Paris, Sept. 29.—The German right wing has been broken up and is now in retreat, pursued by the allies, using armored automobiles, with mitrailleuses and all other cars they are able to requisition in the northern district.
 Information received from northern France shows that the German right wing is in full retreat before the allied forces on Von Kluek's right wing. The enemy sent a parlementaire to General Joffre, offering to surrender on condition that the German troops be allowed to return to Germany with their arms, undertaking to fight no more.
 General Joffre's reply was a command to shell the enemy.
 Not a word of confirmation of the above despatch received last night from The International News Service Paris correspondent has been received today from official sources either of the French or British governments.
 This news is startlingly at variance with all of the reports and all other newspaper despatches, but Mr. Bertelli is the ablest correspondent in France and has intimate friends in the government and in the army, and in this war has been the most unerringly accurate of all correspondents.

COL. GORDON IS ALIVE
 London, Sept. 30.—Col. W. E. Gordon of the Gordon Highlanders, and aide de camp to King George, who has twice unofficially been reported killed, is a prisoner in Germany and in good health. This news was conveyed to the British war office through the American ambassador at Berlin, James W. Gerard.

Col. Gordon, who won the Victoria Cross of the Boer war, was in command of the Gordon Highlanders early in September when they were surprised. They advanced toward a German detachment in the mistaken belief that it was a French picket and many of the Highlanders were shot and down. One of the regiment who escaped said he had seen the body of his colonel among the dead.
