PTE ELMER MANUEL GOES TO FRONT

Son of Emery Manuel of Knowlesville Writes Interesting Letter Home

Shornecliffe, Eng. Dear Mother: I certainly had a good time on my leave, especially in Ireland where I found the people always ready to welcome a soldier; that is, of course, the people of Ulster, which is the only province we visited. We left here Sunday morning and spent the afternoon in London where took a taxi and saw the principal sights, such as Buckingham Palace and Westminster Abbey. Leaving-London at 8.30 we arrived in Stanrear, Scotland, Monday morning where a twohour boat trip took us to Larne. Ireland and wearrived in Londonderry about two o'clock, where two of us stayed until Friday after-We certainly had a good Being the only two Canadains in town for that length of time we were soon well known by sight to all the people of Derry. It is an historic old place and the old walls are still quite intact making a nice walk around the older portion of the town. There is the old church which the inhabitants used so much at the time of the siege and it's a swell old place. too, containing a number of interesting relics of the siege.

Friday afternoon we came to Belfast expecting to sail for Fleetwood on the Mersey the same night, but we found no boats running and were compelled to stay there (and we were not sorry) until six o'clock Saturday night and then came back the way we went, via Larne.

We were over twelve hours ate getting back Sunday afternoon but a ticket from the transport officer in Belfast made that alright.

A week ago today we passed through gas that turned our brass green in about four minutes but we never felt it through our helmets and that completed our trainng in the A. S. C.

Thursday I was put on draft for the infantry and am just lay ing around waiting to be sent over. There will be about 500 of u. I expect to go to the 5th Res. at Sandling, only three miles from here, where what's left of the 169th are stationed.
