Canadian Inshore Fisheries.

Department of Marine and Fisheries, Fisheries Branch, Ottawa, June 6th, 1879.

PUBLIC NOTICE, and particularly the attention of DEEP SEA and INSHORE FISHERMEN, is directed to the following provisions of the Statute in V. C. Cap. 60, known as the FISHERIES ACT, passed on the 22nd May, 1868:

1. Section 14. Prohibits throwing overboard or leaving dead or decaying fish, or remains of dead fish, or other marine animals, within any water where fishing is carried on, or upon any fishing net; also forbids leaving the same in any net or other fishing apparatus.

2. Section 14. Sub-section 2. Provides that dead or decaying fish, or any other deleterious substance, shall not be drawn into, or allowed to pass into, or be left, or remain in any water frequented by any kind of fish mentioned in the fishery law.

3. Section 13. Sub-section 7. Bagnets and trap-nets and fish-pounds are prohibited, excepting upon special license.

Besides the fines imposed by said Statute, any offender against the Fishery Laws liable to the forfeiture of the net, materials, implements or appliances used in connection with the offence.

Fishery Officers may seize upon their own view, or on complaint, any fishing gear subject to confiscation, and fine of offenders forthwith.

British and foreign fishermen alike are required to conform to the Canadian fishery laws.

It having been established in evidence that certain kinds of nets used for mackerel and other fish, are fished in contravention of the fishery laws, by destroying quantities of fish, and by means of many other means, are thrown away dead or dying, or are left to decay on the fish grounds, or within the inland waters, the fishery officers are instructed to strictly enforce the fishery laws passed to prevent such illegal and injurious practices.

They are also instructed that British subjects, when fishing in British waters, are bound to conform in every respect to the Canadian fishery laws, and that foreigners fishing within three miles of the coast of Canada, must conform to the laws of the said country, and are required to do so in conformity with the fishery laws which govern the operations of British fishermen.
